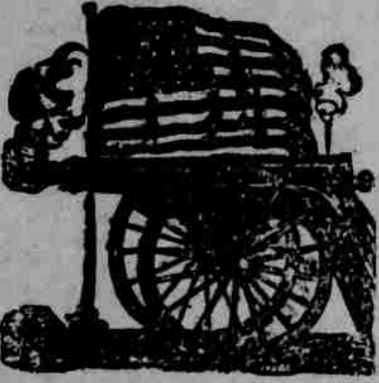

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FUSION STATE TICKET.

The revolutionists of Santo Domingo have over come the federalists in the Santo Domingo islands.

In all probability Hon. John R. McLean, editor of the Cincinnati Enquirer will be the Democratic nominee for Governor of Ohio this fall, with a fair chance of being elected.

The Ohio Democracy in convention assembled yesterday, declared unequivocally for the Chicago platform and Hon. W. J. Bryan, as its candidate for president in 1900. Hon. John R. McLean was nominated for Governor of Ohio, with a good chance of election.

The Democratic campaign fund now being raised for 1900 by "Coin" Harvey in this state has reached the magnificent sum of nearly \$18,000, and will, by the time the presidential campaign opens next year, reach more than 5 times the above amount, comparatively speaking. And every reform voter in Sioux county ought to appropriate, at least, \$1 to that fund.

The nomination at Omaha on the 22nd inst by the fusionists; ex-governor Holcomb for Supreme Judge, and Edson Rich of Omaha and J. L. Testers of Lincoln, for Regents of the state University are an unusually strong ticket and of course is equivalent to an election. Governor Holcomb has a record as governor of this great common wealth, for honesty and integrity that cannot be gainsaid, not withstanding the republican argument to the contrary.

The trusts can be destroyed whenever the people carry their hostility toward the trusts to the point of voting against them. Our remedy, and I believe a complete one, can be found in a law which will require corporations to secure a license before doing business outside of the state in which they are organized. Such license can be issued upon conditions which will squeeze the water out of the stock and prevent monopoly.

Read the declaration of principals enunciated at the fusion state convention at Omaha on the 22nd inst, found on another page of today's Press-Journal. They are a declaration of Principals with no uncertain sound. We earnestly hope that every reader of this paper will read them ever carefully and fairly without prejudice as they strike directly at the root of every politician evil of this nation and the present republican policy.

Judge Shackelford, in the 8th congressional district of Missouri was elected Tuesday to fill out the unexpired term in congress of the late Richard Parks Bland Judge Shackelford was the democratic nominee and was elected by an increased majority of 844 over Mr. Bland's vote in Nov., 1898. The platform of the Democratic and Republican candidates was: Free silver 16 to 1, anti-expansion, anti-imperialism and anti-trusts; gold standard, imperialism and expansion respectively.

According to the Lincoln, Nebraska Post the state of Nebraska has purchased 5,500 voting machines costing \$500, a price, aggregating \$1,000,000. This machine in the invention of George W. Crombitt of Denver, who has been making it for six years, associated

with him in the enterprise is W. W. Tucker of Hartford, Conn.

This machine is purely mechanical in its construction. The regulations are complete in every detail. Split tickets can be voted as readily as straight tickets. The booth stands six and one half feet in height and is about four feet square, giving ample room for voting. Though made of steel it can be carried about without difficulty.

Thirty-five years ago this nation fought one of the most bloody wars, known in history to free 4,000,000 black slaves. Today General Daves, the emissary of President McKinley, has concluded a treaty with the King of the Sulu Islands, permitting that potentate to practice polygamy and serfdom. SCHOOL LAND LEASING.

The following described school lands in Sioux County will be offered for lease at public auction at Harrison at the county treasurer's office, on Sept. 18 1899, beginning at 100 P. M., and continuing until all of said lands have been offered.

These lands may be leased at an annual rental of 4 per cent of the present valuation by the first person offering to take the same when a premium is offered, in which case the lease contract will be awarded to the person paying the greatest amount of bonus therefor. Failing to recieve a bid of six per cent upon said appraised value of any of these lands, they may be leased to the person who will pay 6 per cent upon the highest valuation, as provided in Sec. 15 of the new school land laws.

In order that all interested may have an equal opportunity to secure leases, these lands are hereby withdrawn from the market until the beginning of the public auction aforesaid.

A portion of these lands are vacant by virtue of orders of the Board of Educational Lands and Funds, duly made, and may be redeemed if delinquencies and costs are paid before the land is leased.
