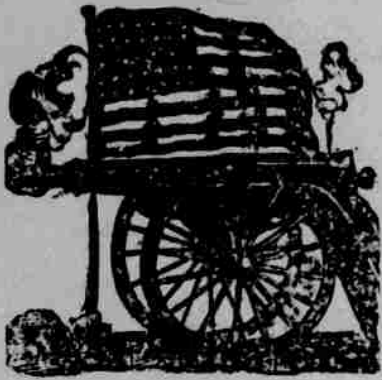

FUSION STATE TICKET.

The German Press with scarcely an exception comments on the Dreyfus judgment with severity, regarding it as evidence of deep national degradation.

Hon. M. C. Harrington of North Platte the democratic nominee for Congress in this big "sixth" district withdraws from the ticket in the interest of harmony which means Judge Neville's election.

Capt. Alfred Dreyfus, who a couple of weeks ago was re-sentenced to a term of ten years penal servitude for high treason is to be pardoned. Thus another instance and proof of the injustice and military force in condemnation of an innocent man.

England is now about to try president McKinley's "benevolent assimilation" policy on the South African government of the Boers. But, like the Filipinos, the Boers propose to sacrifice life, property, home and all that is dear to a liberty loving people in order to maintain their independence from the iron rule England.

Regarding the Democratic victory in Bland's old district, a dispatch from St. Louis to the New York Herald says:

"The result is a distinct victory for the anti-expansion forces, as the battle was mainly fought along that line. The republican candidate, John W. Voshell, in his speeches strongly upheld the republican policy in the Philippines. The democrats vigorously opposed the expansion trend. The skirmish, which ended so disastrously for the administration advocates, is the first fought along that line in the United States; and has a significance national in scope and interests. It was noticed in the votes that where the anti-expansion lines there the republicans lost the heaviest." Up in the Big Sixth district of Nebraska a similar battle is even now being fought--and the result will be the same as in Missouri. Judge Neville shake hands with Judge Shackelford.

DAHLMAN LETS 'EM KNOW.

New York World Wants to Know whether Nebraska is for Bryan.

From the New York World Sunday came this telegram to James C. Dahlman, chairman of the democratic state central committee:

"Hon. James C. Dahlman, Omaha: Will you please telegraph at our expense your opinion on the following questions:

"First--Would Dewey, if nominated by democratic convention splendidly represent democratic principles? would he not surely beat McKinley?

"Second--If Bryan's own state should defeat his ticket and platform this year would he be as likely to win as Dewey in 1900?"

NEW YORK WORLD.

Mr. Dahlman telegraphed this reply:

To the New York World; I, Dewey, in my judgment would not represent democratic principles. He will not be nominated Nebraska will endorse Bryan by a larger majority this year than ever before, and he will defeat William McKinley or any other republican next year.

The national Bankers association which met in annual convention in Toledo Ohio a couple of weeks ago, declared without reserve in favor of the gold standard and the retirement of the greenbacks. That is the final ultimatum from the money power and if possible propose to have it that way. See?

The Long Plus Journal, published by L. M. Bates, its new editor, but formerly under the old title Republican Journal by B. B. Smith is now before us and indicates very plainly that Mr. Bates understands how to run a country newspaper just the same. It will be conducted along the line of republican principles, whatever that may mean in this day and age of the world. However all the newspaper boys of Nebraska wish him a hearty success in future.

That antiquated, hunk of administration patriotism, Grandma Otis, now commanding the U. S. forces in the Philippine islands against the liberty loving insurgents who were Admiral Dewey's allies during the war with Spain, has shown his friendship for his soldier boys by having one of the privates in the 25th Ohio volunteers arrested, court martialed sentenced to one year imprisonment in a military prison, and dishonorably dismissed from his regiment for the crime of writing a personal letter to his majesty, grandma Otis, asking for an examination for promotion to the 1st Lieutenant of his company. The young man, whose name is Charles Hoon, is now languishing in durance vile for that awful and malicious crime insulting the pompous Otis. The army of the United States like her sister republic France in the Dreyfus case must--whether right or wrong must be maintained, even though the accused be innocent.

The white miners of Carterville, Ills. have taken up the black man's burden again and have shot seven of them down in cold blood, so the daily Denver News of the 18th inst says. The only reason being, that the colored men were miners and were non-union laborers, hence the murderous crime. To us it would be the proper thing for the state authorities to apprehend the guilty ones and punish them to the full extent of the law. In our opinion, there is no crime where the people are justified in taking the law into their own hands and punish this offense of working without having joined some particular branch of the labor unions. The PRESS-JOURNAL is honestly and candidly in favor of laborers organization as a protection of their interests. But they should not be used as a menace to life and liberty.

If Brer Broom of the Alliance Grip who is owned soul and body by the B & M road and who is an ardent gold standard advocate would come out openly and above board for the republican party he would then, be consistent, and besides--from the republican point of view--be justified in lauding ex-president Cleveland, and president McKinley to the skies. All the difference between Hon. W. J. Bryan, and president McKinley is that the former is free and independent he has the courage of his convictions; stands for a principle which represents democracy and the common interests of the "plain people". The latter is owned soul and body by Mark Hanna, the money power and the trusts who holds a \$118,000 mortgage against him as a persuader to compel him to act at all times in their interests, which he does gracefully.

Hon. W. J. Bryan, is now busy campaigning in the big "sixth" congressional district, immense crowds go to hear the champion of the people.

GREENBACKS or Government Money.

At close of our Civil War in 1865, there appeared in the London Times the following:

"If that mischievous financial policy which had its origin in the North American Republic during the late Civil War in that country, should be inducted down to a future, then that government will furnish its money without cost. It will have all the money that is necessary to carry on its trade and commerce. It will become prosperous beyond precedent in the history of civilized nations of the world. The brain and wealth of all countries will go to North America. THAT GOVERNMENT MUST BE DESTROYED OR IT WILL DESTROY EVERY MONARCHY ON THIS GLOBE."

The famous Hazzard circular, to capitalists in New York, and the Bull Bank circular to United States Bankers, both emanating from London, and the fabulous corruption fund raised in England and Germany, estimated at \$1,500,000, were the agents that secured the closing of our mints against silver.

The "walk into my parlor" policy of England, during and since the Spanish War, is the latest evidence of English Diplomacy in shaping the destiny of the United States Government.

Notwithstanding the famine price of wheat, the Spanish War, and fabulous expenditures of money by our government during the past year, gold has increased in value eleven per cent, and all other values decreased in the same proportion.
