Takes lots of the money to get a little wire and a few nails.—Teller.

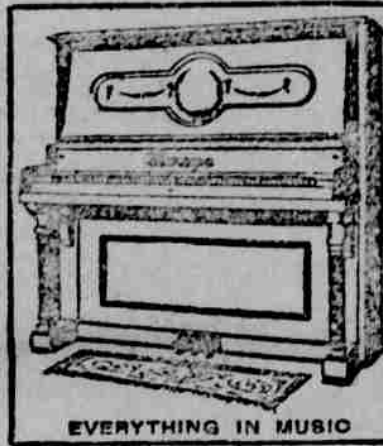
