Article XIII: First neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Notice That Uncle Sam Will Protect England.

Washington, October 27.—The position of the United States is described in these propositions authoritatively. Translated, the attitude of the United States is that no "compensation" shall be found elsewhere, no matter what Great Britain does in South Africa and is as follows: It will participate in no effort at mediation. It will participate in no note of interrogation as to Great Britain's ultimate intentions in South Africa. It will regard intervention by European Powers as a menace to the well-being of all nations, and as likely to disturb general commercial relations. It believes that intervention would lead to conflict among nations, thus involving all the questions of national supremacy disturbing the balance of power and injecting the Chinese question, in which the United States has important interests. It will not consent to a change in the conditions of China without consultation. It "will stand at the gateway of China" as a matter of national duty to preserve the status quo there. It cannot be indifferent to any demonstration of interference in South Africa by any nation not directly involved in the Transvaal war.—Daily Cincinnati Enquirer.

Ex-Secretary Sherman's Sentiment's.

Columbus, O., Oct. 28.—The Columbus Press Post wired Hon. John Sherman today when there had been doubt expressed by republican papers as to the authenticity of the interview with him, published in the Cincinnati Enquirer, Mr. Sherman replied as follows: "To the Editor of the Press post: I am strongly opposed to enforced annexation of the Philippine islands. We co-operated with Filipinos in driving the Spanish out and should now help them to form a republican government of their own. The seizure of any part of the Philippines against their will is a gross violation of the laws of the nations.—Daily Cincinnati Enquirer.

It will have all the money that is necessary to carry on its trade and commerce. It will become prosperous beyond precedent in the history of civilized nations of the world. The brain and wealth of all countries will go to North America. THAT GOVERNMENT MUST BE DESTROYED OR IT WILL DESTROY EVERY MONARCHY ON THIS GLOBE."

The famous Hazzard circular, to capitalists in New York, and the Buell Bank circular to United States Bankers, both emanating from London, and the fabulous corruption fund raised in England and Germany, estimated at \$1,500,000, were the agents that secured the closing of our mints against silver.

The "walk into my parlor" policy of England, during and since the Spanish War, is the latest evidence of English Diplomacy in shaping the destiny of the United States Government.
