The republican majority in State of New York, in 1896, was 246,000; in 1897, 80,000; in 1898, 18,500; in 1899, 9,300.

Total majority in 4 years 353,800. Or, an average yearly loss to the g. o. p. in the four years of 88,450 votes.

In reality Ohio was lost to the republican party by 50,000 votes, not withstanding the administration candidate for governor was elected.

Kentucky, even though the republican candidate for governor should be declared elected and inaugurated by Gov. Bradley and his state militia, whether right or wrong, there is a loss of near 25,000 votes to the McHanna gold standard, high protection and trust creating party of imperialism and foreign aggression.

Maryland, well, there is a clear loss to the party, who are opposed to the Declaration of Independence, of 20,000 votes.

Pennsylvania, Boss Quay's own state, where republican corruption in politics runs supreme, are short 130,000 republican votes since 1896--so says honest John Wansensaker.

Old Massachusetts, the seat of learning and the birth-place of Faneuil Hall, called, "the Cradle of American Liberty," were short; election day to the g. o. p., trust and military party of 25,000 votes which, of course must be significant to the McHanna's that the people of Massachusetts are sickening of the party, who are opposed, to freedom and the declaration of Independence.

Iowa, did not make any gains over the 1896 election and on account of Senator Gear, wishing to succeed himself, and a Mr. Cummings, who was making a hard fight for the election to succeed Mr. Gear brought out every republican vote in the state, on the other hand candidate White, the Democratic candidate was a defeated candidate once before and hence was an unpopular candidate.

South Dakota, of course made republicans, but the reform parties done little or no campaigning and lost the state by an ex-party vote.

Colorado, stands pat, and will be on hand in 1900 with her usual majority for Mr. Bryan and free silver.

Nebraska, every body knows about it and will be all O. K. in 1900 look out for a bigger majority than ever.

Democracy after all have great reason to be thankful for the bright prospects that looms up on the political horizon in 1900. Every true reformer should stand by principal, and next year assist in a glorious victory for the people.

No improvement in senator Hayward's physical condition is reported by the daily papers of Lincoln and Omaha, up to time of going to press. They do, however, continue to say the Senator is a very sick man.

Little change is reported in the British and Boer war in the Transvaal. Lady-smith, Mafeking and Kimberly, are still holding out against the Boers. May God bless the Boers in their effort to sustain and maintain their freedom.

The Louisville (Neb.) Weekly Kicker, prohibited from being entered as second class matter at the local post office by a partisan republican postmaster, with the help of a partisan post office department at Washington, sent after election, and thereby compelling its editor to pay 16c a pound in order to have his paper go to the readers of the Kicker through the U. S. mails instead of 1c a pound as other papers. However, since Hon. W. J. Bryan is a bigger man in Nebraska, than president Mark Hanna is in Ohio, the postal authorities at Washington have consented to permit the Kicker to pass through the mails on a par with the g. o. p. federation, country news paper.

The very thing the republican party condemned ex-president Cleveland for, under his administration; the pardoning of criminals and seeking to destroy and debase our silver currency, president McKinley and his cabinet is now emulating that unique freak of the Jersey duck swamps. Every body knows how the president and his trust cabinet are working to demoralize half of our metallic currency and in less than three years, Mr. McKinley has pardoned 328 criminals of every description and commuted 128 of every description. Mr. McKinley is helping Wall Street financially just like Mr. Cleveland did. Thus it is a parallel policy, excepting, probably, Mr. Cleveland would have opposed an Anglo-Saxon alliance with England, and the Philippine war, hence, the choice--if any--would be in favor of the ex-president. There will be more gobbled up dinners today than for the past year.

The Knights of Labor, in their General Assembly meeting held at Boston, on the 23rd inst, passed resolutions condemning the national administration for its Philippine policy, also censuring the president for his enmity against organized labor. Following is the resolution: Resolved--That, The General Assembly of the K. of L. condemns the foreign policy of the National Administration in its effort to subjugate the Philippines by conquest, and opposes the extension of our territory or government beyond the limits of this continent as contrary to American people's interests and the interests of the great mass of working people.--Daily Cincinnati (O.) Enquirer.

Crocker Says M'Kinley Is At Head of Trusts.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 24.--Richard Crocker, on the eve of his departure for Europe today, made some rather serious charges against president McKinley.

The Tammany leader said that Mr. McKinley is at the head of the greatest trusts in the United States. The recent Gage deal in bonds was cited to bear out this statement.

Mr. Crocker roared the trust generally and asserted that the president's cabinet is nothing more nor less than a gigantic trust company.--Daily (Denver) News
