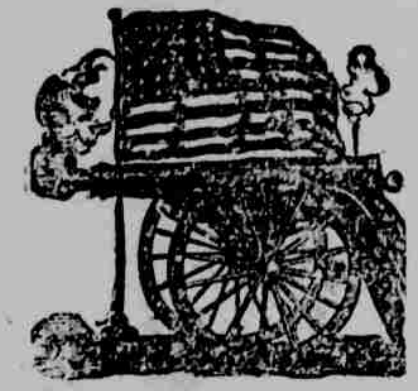

SENATOR HAYWARD PASSES AWAY.

NEBRASKA CITY, NEB., Dec. 5.—United States Senator Hayward passed away peacefully at his home in this city at 6:15 a. m., after a brave struggle for life since November 9, when he suffered a third stroke of paralysis as he was going home from his office.—World-Herald.

THE GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION

OUT OF RESPECT OF SENATOR HAYWARD'S DEATH.

Headquarters Nebraska National Guard, Adjutant General's office, Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 5.—General order No. 25.

First.—By direction of his excellency, the governor, the following proclamation is published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

"By the governor of the state of Nebraska: A proclamation to the people of the state of Nebraska: Monroe L. Hayward, senator of the United States, died at his home in Nebraska City, Neb., at 6:30 a. m., this morning. In him the state has lost one of its most illustrious citizens and faithful servants. His participation in the early organization of our state government was marked by an unwavering fidelity of a very high order and the care manifested by him in all matters of public importance showed the zeal with which he guarded the interests of his adopted state. The close of his too brief career as a senator of the United States is regretted by all. His private life was gentle and noble, and his firmness of disposition won the respect of all. In sorrowful testimony of

the loss which has fallen upon our state, I direct that on the day of the funeral all flags upon the armories and public buildings of the state, school districts and municipalities shall be displayed at half staff until the day following the funeral.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the great seal of Nebraska. Done at Lincoln, this 5th day of December, A. D. 1899.

They also declared, individually, that Hon. W. J. Bryan was the true exponent of real reforms and of course was the proper candidate for the reform parties next year.

Increase in wages, 10 per cent.
Increase in trust profits, 180 per cent.
Increase in cost to consumers, 190 per cent.

In another column we reprint part of an editorial from the Daily News, Denver, suggesting the nomination of Bryan & Schley for President and Vice President, respectively on the democratic ticket in 1900. The NEWS-JOURNAL rises to second that nomination. Yes, better still, suspend the rules and nominate by acclamation. It would unite the East and West democracy that no political combination could possibly separate them in the future.
