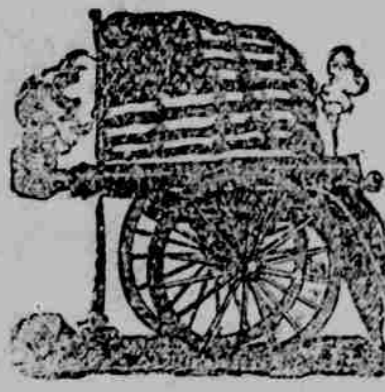

As a result of the death of senator Monroe L. Hayward, who was elected to succeed Hon. William V. Allen, by the legislature down at Lincoln last winter, it now becomes the duty of Gov. Poynter to appoint somebody to fill the vacancy until the next regular session of the legislature meets and elects in the usual way.

It also transpires that editor Gilbert M. Hitchcock of the World Herald, Hon. W. H. Thompson of Grand Island, and Hon. ex-senator Adon of Madison, who was defeated by the late Senator Hayward, last winter, are candidates for the appointment to that high office.

From what we know of the gentlemen, they are, all three of them eminently fitted and qualified to fill the high and important position with credit to the state of Nebraska, should the Governor see fit to appoint any one of the three gentlemen. While we believe ex-senator Allen, with his experience of six years in the upper house of our national congress, would naturally be the proper person for appointment. But Mr. Hitchcock has rendered valuable services to the fusionists of this state and, in fact, to them throughout the nation, and should be appointed will undoubtedly meet the approval of the majority of the Peoples Party, Silver Republicans and Democrats throughout Nebraska, as a just recognition of his unselfish and valuable services which Mr. Hitchcock has given most cheerfully and generously and we presume, with never a thought of political reward.

If for any reason, best known to himself, Gov. Poynter should appoint editor Hitchcock instead of ex-senator Allen, the PRESS-JOURNAL will be equally pleased and will hasten to be among the first who will offer congratulations to Mr. Hitchcock on his appointment.

The President's message to the 56th congress appears in this week's PRESS-JOURNAL. Every body should read it and contemplate what the Republican party of today proposes to do in order to reduce nine tenths of the people to vassals. Hon. W. P. Taylor of Kentucky, who on the face of the returns was declared defeated Nov. 7th, was by the state canvassing board declared elected on the 5th inst and inaugurated Monday the 12th.

The British forces in Cape Colony, in a recent fierce engagement at Stromburg, were defeated and forced to retreat by the Boer forces and out of two thousand men, upwards of 700 are reported dead, wounded and missing from the British.
