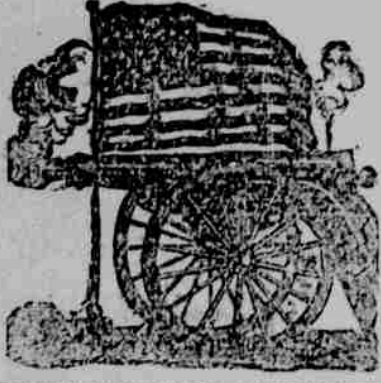

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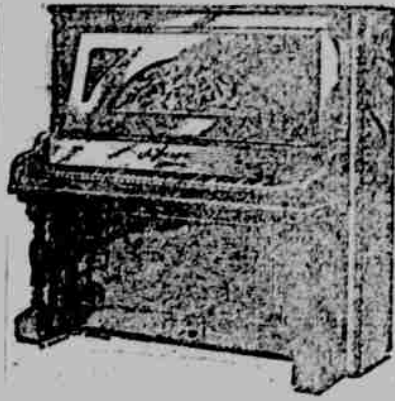
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BOERS VICTORIOUS AGAIN.

Cable dispatches from the front in the South African war, part of which are confirmed by official dispatches of the British commanders, announce that serious defeats have been met by the English forces with consequent triumphs of the Boers. The British have been compelled to retreat from Borefontein, and the fighting continues around Colesburg. A third of the Suffolk regiment, under General French, with seven officers, surrendered to the Boers at Colesburg. The Boers have captured Kuruman, in British Bechuanaland, taking 100 prisoners, including eleven officers. The latest report is that an attack on Ladysmith has been repulsed, with heavy losses to the Boers.—Daily World Herald.

In all probability, W. C. Taylor, who now occupies the governors chair in Kentucky, by fraud and intimidation at the polls on election day Nov. 7 last, will have to vacate that high place, before the closing of the legislature of that state which is now in session.

It is beyond the comprehension of finite, intelligent beings, why the republicans as a party can and do sympathize with the Boers in their desperate and brave fight for liberty and freedom, the God-given right of man, and on the other hand advocate the destruction by shot and shell of the people of the Philippine Islands, who are guilty of no greater offense than the Boers.

The policy of robbing and looting the United States treasury as instituted by Secretary Gage, and the New York City national bank, a Rockefeller institution, has created such a scandal in Mr. McKinley's cabinet, and for which the president is responsible, that congress voted unanimously to investigate Mr. Gage's favorability to the Standard Oil Co., which may result in that gentleman's impeachment.

The celebration of the "St. Jackson's" day all over the nation by the Democracy, last Monday, is significant from the fact that the same conditions, comfort the people today, viz: the national banking system and money power which comforted the country in 1828, which was dealt a death blow by president Jackson. People recall Nicholas Biddle, who, at that time undertook to establish a money trust in the form of a national bank, but was frustrated by the patriotic veto power of president Jackson. Lyman J. Gage, the present Secretary of the U. S. Treasury, is the prototype of Nick Biddle of old, and unless an Andrew Jackson can be elected president in this year of our Lord, 1900, to succeed Mr. McKinley, the agent of the money trusts, it will be good bye for the people in the future.

They are shooting down liberty in South Africa, while you are shooting it down in the Philippine Islands. There is evidence sufficient enough that both governments are operating upon parallel lines. The first blossom of liberty in the orient to be cut off by the republican party of the United States, the first substantial struggle for liberty in Africa to be mowed down in its infancy by the queen of England, with the czar as king for a peace conferee.
