CHICAGO ONCE A SEASIDE TOWN

WARREN'S FORCES FIND SPION KOP TOO HOT TO HOLD.

Boers State that the Number of British Dead on the Battlefield Number Fifteen Hundred.

London—(Special).—General Buller's dispatch to the war office states that Spion Kop was abandoned on account of lack of water, inability to bring artillery there and the heavy Boer fire.

BULLER'S REPORT IN FULL.

Following is the text of General Buller's dispatch, dated Spearman's camp, January 27, 8:15 p. m. "On January 20 Warren drove back the enemy and obtained possession of the southern crest of the high tableland extending from the line of Acton Homes and Honger's port to the western Ladysmith hills.

ENGLAND TO MOBILIZE ALL HER RESERVE SQUADRON.

Detaining of the Fleet of Warships Causes Speculation as to Important Movements.

London—(Special).—The Daily Telegraph's Portsmouth correspondent in a significant dispatch this morning says: "In the naval circles of Portsmouth there is a strong impression that before long the government will mobilize the reserve squadron and commission several cruisers to be added to it.

DEFIES DIAZ AND SWEEPS ENTIRE SONORA DISTRICT.

Mexican Regulars Dare Not Enter the Mountains Where the Indians are Well Organized.

A recent telegram from El Paso, Tex., stating that the Yaqui Indians have established a provisional government at Bapise, Sonora, and mean to ask the United States government to formally recognize them, calls to mind the fact that the American campers and herders and rangers in these mountains have always taken the part of the aborigines in the numerous petty wars waged on them by the Mexican government.

CO-OPERATIVE CREAMERY.

PRO-BOER MEETING.
