Democratic State Convention.

The Chairman and Secretary of the Democratic state central committee have issued a call for a Democratic state Convention, to be held at Lincoln, Nebraska, Monday March 19th 1900. Sioux county will be entitled to three delegates in that convention. It is for the purpose of electing 16 delegates to the national Democratic convention which will doubtless be called to meet, possibly in New York City about the first of June Next.

Call for County Convention.

A delegate convention of the Peoples Independent Party, of Sioux County, Nebraska is hereby called to meet at the Court House of said county, in Harrison, on Thursday, March 1st, 1900 at 1 o'clock, for the purpose of selecting delegates to the State Convention of said party.
