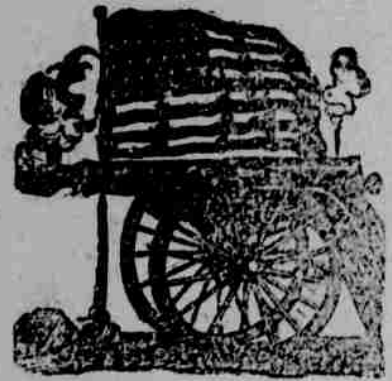

We doubt it very much--but hope it is true that no more bloodshed will take place in Kentucky.

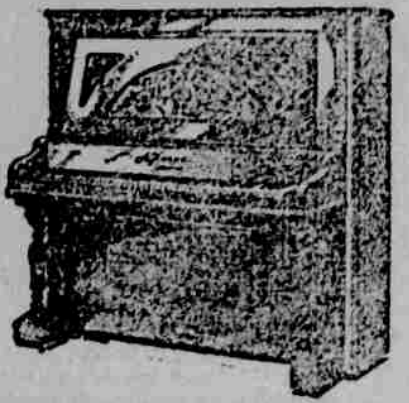

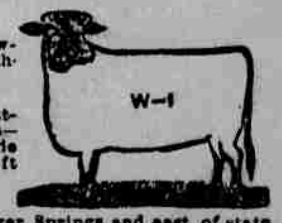
