Call for Democratic County Convention.

Notice is hereby given that a delegate convention of the Democratic party of Sioux county, Neb., is called to meet at the Court House in Harrison, in said county, at one o'clock p. m., Thursday, March 1st, 1900, for the purpose of electing 3 delegates to attend the Democratic State convention to be held at Lincoln, Neb., March 19, 1900.

The several precincts of said county are entitled to one delegate at large, and one delegate for each ten votes or major fraction thereof, based on the vote cast for Hon. Edson Rich, for Regent of the State University at the last general election of 1899. Following are the number of delegates apportioned to each precinct:

Call for County Convention.

A delegate convention of the Peoples Independent Party, of Sioux County, Nebraska is hereby called to meet at the Court House of said county, in Harrison, on Thursday, March 1st, 1900 at 1 o'clock, for the purpose of selecting delegates to the State Convention of said party.

It is recommended that no proxies be allowed but that the delegates present cast the full vote of the precinct, and that the primaries be held at the usual polling places in each precinct on Saturday February 24, 1900.

Democratic State Convention.

The Chairman and Secretary of the Democratic state central committee have issued a call for a Democratic state Convention, to be held at Lincoln, Nebraska, Monday March 19th 1900. Sioux county will be entitled to three delegates in that convention. It is for the purpose of electing 16 delegates to the national Democratic convention which will doubtless be called to meet, possibly in New York City about the first of June Next.

Peoples Party State Convention.

The Peoples Independent Party state Convention, will be held at Lincoln Neb. at 8 o'clock P. M. at the Auditorium building, on the 19th day of March, 1900 A. D.

The State convention is called for the purpose of electing delegates to attend the Peoples Independent Party National convention. Who will nominate a candidate for president, to be voted for at the 1900 presidential election.

The basis of representation is one delegate at large for each county and one delegate for each 100 votes, or major fraction thereof cast for Silas A. Holcomb, in the election for 1899, for supreme Judge; and Sioux county will be entitled to 4 delegates.
