EDITORIAL.

In the True Populist, D. Clem Deaver, its editor declares that lawyers are the dross of society.

Mayor Moore of Omaha was re-elected Tuesday by about 1,000 majority. The fusionists probably elected the tax commissioner, with three of the council candidates in doubt.

As long as Clem Deaver of Omaha, was drawing a good salary, for four years, under a fusion Governor, fusion was O. K. with D. Clem, but when he had to give way to some other fusionist, who had made it possible for him to draw that salary, then the d-- was to pay. That is the way with a hog anyway.

Without doubt Hon. W. J. Bryan will be nominated for president by the fusion forces of the United States. It will be necessary to formulate a platform as Mr. Bryan stands for the best interests of the great common people and hence, he is a platform within himself, and if elected he will carry out the principles of the people, whose interests he represents.

We must combat the notion that our country can do no wrong. She can; and she will if we let her. Human nature would always be doing wrong if we did not try not to. Precisely because we are in a war, it is the time when every American needs most to remember his obligations, and to watch that the honor of his country be not left to a venal few or an intoxicated many.

What easy game the politicians find out! How confidently he counts upon our human frailty! How coldbloodedly he baits our very virtues to serve his ends! He knows that we dislike trouble—and self government, certainly, is some trouble. Well, we can just leave things to him. He knows that all hearts ... admire loyalty, and that most of us are more afraid of being called "traitors" by a poster than we are of an array with banners. So his progress is to support him, and himself to do only what we can decently support; and then ... demands our "loyalty" to measure he would no more have dared to suggest beforehand than he would have dared put his head in the fire. But he is well aware that ... we will follow him almost any where after once promising to follow him to good things. He counts on this as coolly as a business man counts his assets—and with as substantial reason. It is 90 per cent of his capital.

President McKinley tells us that "we have expanded," and that it is no longer a question ... But probably it is not yet to late in this country for a plain American to raise and ask: "How? When? Who? Why? What was the date and what were the circumstances?" Certainly to annual the Constitution of the United States must have taken a specific act, by specific persons, at a specific point of time. These things do not come by evaporation nor as a dream in the night, without agent or chronology or responsibility. If there are no Americans left who might be responsible. If there are no Americans left who might be courageous, the historian at least will wish to know. . . . If for more than a century we have been wasting our own time and that of congress, and the thing can be so easily done without any help from us, let us know how, that we may save trouble next time.
