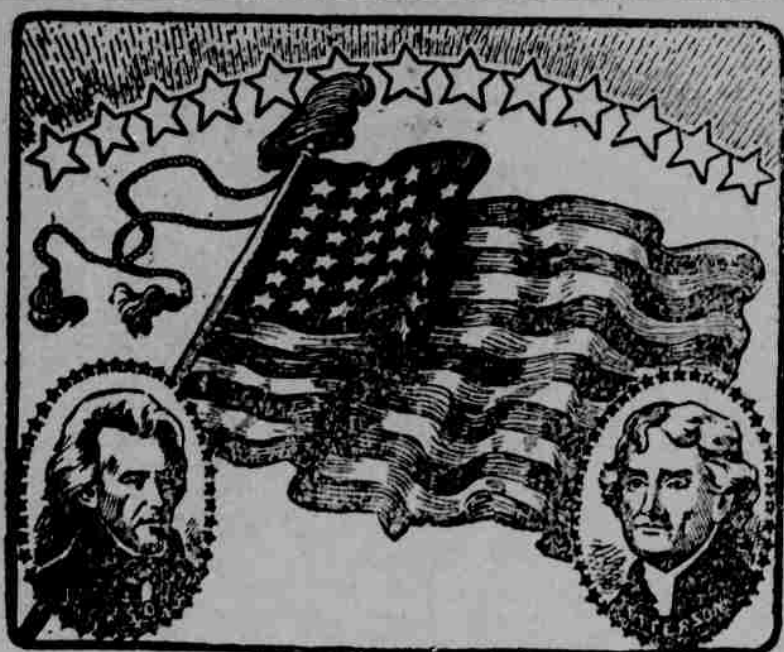

This government is fast drifting into the same condition that Rome was in—militarism and imperialism, and the country dominated by the money power—when it fell to destruction. Read what the great historian Froude said about Rome, and then make your comparison:

The highest office of state were open to the meanest citizens; they were confined in fact to those who had the longest purses.

Distinctions of birth had been exchanged for distinctions of wealth.

The free cultivators were disappearing from the soil. Italy was being absorbed into vast estates held by a few favored families and cultivated by slaves, while the old agricultural population was driven off the land and crowded into towns; the occupation of the higher classes was to obtain money without labor and spend it in idle enjoyment.

Patriotism survived on the lips, but patriotism meant the ascendancy of the party which would maintain the existing order of things.

Public spirit in the masses was dead or sleeping. The common-wealth was a plutocracy. The free forms of the constitution were themselves the instrument of corruption. Redemption, if redemption was to be hoped for, could only come from free citizens in the country districts. The numbers of such citizens were fast dwindling away before the omnivorous appetite of the rich for territorial aggrandizement.—Froude.

When Babylon fell two per cent of the population practically owned all the wealth.

Egypt was marked for overthrow when two per cent of her people owned ninety-seven per cent of the wealth.

All the land in Persia was owned by one per cent of her people when her downfall came.

This uniform experience of historical nations has been crystallized by the poet Goldsmith into the following words:

Ill faces the land, to hastening ill a prey,
Where wealth accumulates and men decay.

A Short Story in Figures.

The ordinary annual expenditures of the Government averaged in President Harrison's term \$331,291,823.

They averaged in President Cleveland's second term \$300,418,545.

They have averaged in President McKinley's term \$614,430,251.

The cost of running the Government is thus seen to have been incalculable by nearly \$154,000,000 a year ever since Mr McKinley was inaugurated. And this is not accounted for by the extraordinary disbursements of the war, which are not included in these "ordinary expenditures."

The outlay for war is a separate matter, and it accounts for the increase of the public debt by \$200,000,000 since Mr. McKinley's inauguration.

The financial record of the Administration may therefore be summed up in a sentence. It has added nearly \$12,000,000 a month to the regular running expenses of the Government and added \$1.75 per capita to the national burden of debt.

PATRON SAINT OF LAWYERS

How many readers know the name of the patron saint of the lawyer? Very few, Mr. Crooke James, in his book of "Curiosities of Law and Lawyers," tells us. It appears that in the fourteenth century St. Evona, or Yves, of Brittany, a famous Lawyer of his time, was lamenting that his profession had no patron saint to look up to. So he went to Rome and asked the Pope to set the matter straight. The Pope was puzzled. Finally he told the lawyer to go blindfolded around the church of San Giovanni, and after he had said a certain number of Ave Maria's the first saint he took hold of should be his patron. St. Evona followed directions, and at the proper moment, laying his hands on an image, proclaimed with joy. "This is our saint—this be our patron." But when the bandage was taken from his eyes he found that he had stopped at the altar of St. Michael, and instead of taking hold of St. Michael himself he had grasped the figure beneath St. Michael's feet—the devil! It is said in an old legend that St. Evona was so dejected over the outcome of his enterprise that in a few months he died. When at St. Peter's gate he knelt for admittance and explained that he was St. Evona, the advocate, he was told that there was no room in heaven for lawyers. "Oh, but" said St. Evona, "I am that honest lawyer who never took fees on both sides, nor pleaded in a bad cause; nor did I ever set my neighbors together by the ears, nor live by the sins of the people." St. Peter's heart was moved and he let the suppliant in, whereupon the good advocate of Brittany became the patron saint of lawyers himself.—The New York Verdict.

The Work of the Trusts.

About the first of July, 1899, the Central Foundry Co., of New York city bought up all the individual foundries of Medina, N. Y., and the consolidation has already brought serious injury to the town.

No. 4. soil pipe previous to this consolidation was selling for 6.4 cent per foot but the trust raised the price to 22 cents per foot but the laborers have received no increase in wages.

In November, 1898, cast iron scrap was purchased by the various foundries at \$7.59 per ton, but last November the trust only paid \$6 per ton.

The price of the finished product was raised nearly four hundred per cent while the price of the raw material was reduced nearly twenty per cent.

The trust has driven twenty-one married men out of town which means considerable for a village of the size of Medina.

Men who have worked in the foundries at Medina for years have been thrown out of employment because they refused to quit the union.

As a result of this object lesson many Republicans in the town say that they have voted the Republican ticket for the last time.—Lincoln (Nebr.) Post.

Oom Paul and the Boers.

It is related of President Kruger that when Jews first began to flock to Pretoria he was unfavorably disposed toward them and used them severely, but after a time relented somewhat, and finally gave them leave to build a synagogue. They were grateful, and when the synagogues were built they asked him to come and open it. The story is and it assumes to be a true one that the old man accepted the invitation, and, standing on the platform, duly said: "In the name of the father, and of the son, and of the Holy Ghost, I declare this synagogue opened. Now, my friends, I hope you will lose no time in becoming converted."—Life.

Paris and her great Fair.

The saying that Paris is France contains, of course, only half a truth. No metropolis can fully exhibit the life of a people. But, on the other hand, it is doubtless true that no other capital city is so representative as Paris of all that characterizes the nation; and this overshadowing importance of the French capital has never been so marked as in the last years of our closing century. But, during the Exposition period, Paris becomes also a rendezvous and center of ideas for the whole world. The Exposition then may be conceived of as the City of Paris occupying itself with the entertainment of a sort of congress of the nations—with a gracious display by all of things interesting and characteristic that illustrate their history and contemporary life; nothing being done in the spirit of rivalry, but all in a generous spirit of kindness and helpfulness.
