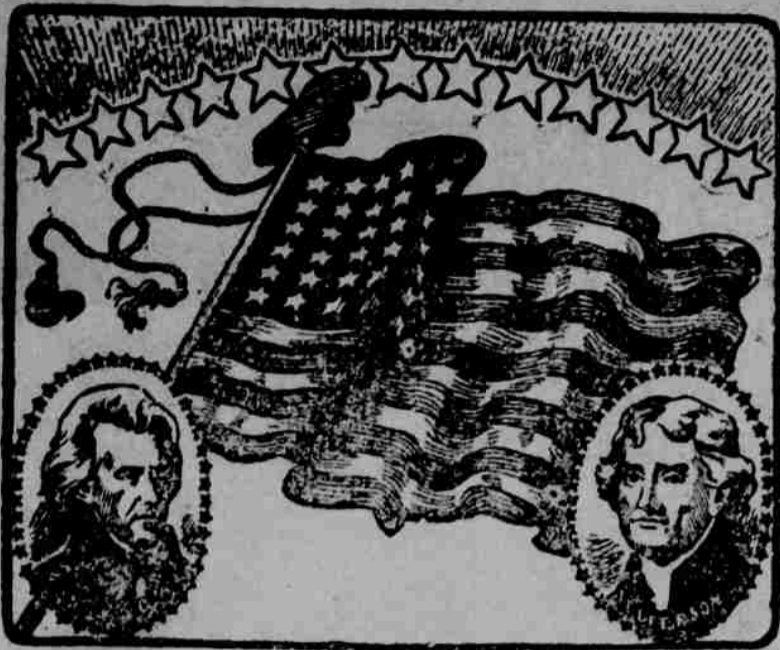

## BRYAN AND STEVENSON.

The National Democratic convention which convened at Kansas City, Mo., July 4th, and concluded its labors the 6th, nominated Hon. William J. Bryan for president and Hon. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois for vice president.

While our choice for vice president of the United States was Charles A. Towne of Minnesota, first, last, and all the time in that convention, yet we are always submissive to the rule of the majority when men, who are nominated are in thorough accord with the principles that underlie the party of the people. Both Mr. Bryan and Mr. Stevenson stand squarely on the platform which is good enough and broad enough for every voter in the United States to stand on, who believe in the perpetuity of this great and glorious Republic of ours, whose government is, "of the people, by the people and for the people."

The re-affirmation of the Chicago Platform with the additional planks, denouncing imperialism, militarism, trusts; declaring for the Declaration of Independence and constitution of the United States and for an inalienable, owned, controlled and fortified by the United States, cannot but meet the approval of every voter in the nation. Even without a single word of a platform, William J. Bryan, the standard-bearer of the people is sufficient guarantee that their interests will not suffer at his hands, when he takes charge of the government, next 4th of March 1901.

Why make gold the standard? There is not gold enough in the whole world to pay off the public and private debts of the State of New York.

We regret exceedingly that the National Democratic and Silver Republican party when at Kansas city could not have nominated candidates to suit our republican friends, as they would not have cause for so much worry as at present.

It is amusing to hear some of our republican brethren, expressing their regret that Towne was not nominated, and the reason they give, is that the party will lose votes thereby. How sympathetic they are indeed, if they fear thus then the only way they can do, to help matters will be to vote for Bryan and Stevenson.

For the benefit of those who regret Mr. Towne's not receiving the nomination, and their fear lest perhaps the democratic ticket will lose votes thereby, we wish to say that Mr. Towne is not worrying any over the matter, but to the public he has made the statement that he is in at Bryan's command and will work coat off for the ticket.

This issue of the PRESS-JOURNAL contains the Democratic platform. We hope every body who gets a copy of the paper will read the platform thoroughly and then compare it with the republican platform and learn which is the most American and which stands for freedom the Declaration of Independence and the maintenance of the Republic.

And now that the National ticket is in the field, each reform voter should and doubtless will do all he can against our common enemies, viz imperialism, trusts and combines, and the Gold Standard, and they should remember that in fighting these their greatest enemies, they are only defending their own and their children's rights, and obtaining anew the true privileges of all liberty loving American citizens. A vote for the fusion ticket, national state and county officers, from the majority, will insure this. A vote for Bryan and Stevenson, the people's choice, will guarantee this as it will also insure the money of our fathers and put in force once more, the only one aim of these same fathers in signing the declaration of independence and framing the constitution of the United States, crushed, to the earth, by the Mc Hannan imperialism, regime.
