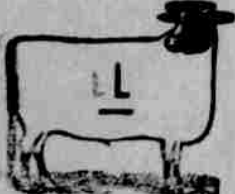

#### Relic of a Bygone Age.

#### Cure for Tired Nerves.

A note from Geneva states that a  
Swiss physician has invented a new  
cure for nervous diseases. It is  
made with melted snow; the snow is  
melted first, and then the water is  
boiled. The taste of the tea, it is  
said, is insipid and disagreeable, but  
soothes the nerves. It is reported that  
a number of nervous people have been  
cured by it.

#### MEASURING THE AIR'S DUST.

Ingenuous Apparatus Devised by a New  
German Scientist.

An ingenious apparatus for estimat-  
ing the amount of dust in the air has  
just been devised by Karl Arens. It  
consists of a glass tube loosely packed  
with cotton wool and connected with  
an aspirating apparatus on the prin-  
ciple of bellows, says an exchange.

After the tube and the wool have  
been perfectly dried they are weighed  
and then a given volume of the air  
to be tested is drawn through, carrying  
with it its quota of dust and moisture.  
The tube is then allowed to stand  
over strong sulphuric acid for twenty-  
four hours, or until the moisture is at-  
tracted from the wool. The tube and  
its contents are now weighed again  
and the increase in weight represents  
the amount of dust in the given vol-  
ume of air.

A great many experiments have  
been tried with the new instrument  
and among the results are the follow-  
ing, which show in milligrams the  
amount of dust per cubic meter found  
in the air in the places mentioned:  
Laboratory, 1.4; schoolroom, 10; horse-  
hair factory, 17; saw factory, 17 and  
15; woolen factory (picking-room), 7;  
woolen factory (cutting room), 20;  
flour mill, 22 and 23; iron foundry,  
(fifteen to twenty workmen), 25; iron  
foundry (not previously used), 1.5;  
iron foundry (few workmen), 12; iron  
foundry (during interval), 8; steel  
factory 73; snuff factory (before grind-  
ing), 14; cement works (during work),  
124; cement works (in an interval),  
150.

#### Race Suicide in New Zealand.

In New South Wales the children  
under 5 years old were actually less in  
number than they were ten years ago,  
while in some states there are fewer  
under 10 years than in 1891. In New  
Zealand complaint is made that there  
are not enough children to fill the  
schools. Mr. Coghlan notes that the  
immigration of young married women  
has fallen off in recent years, yet in  
1887 there were in New South Wales  
112,247 married women under 45  
years, while in 1891 there were 142,  
247; still the number of children born  
was about the same in each year, and  
in Australia and New Zealand there  
are now annually 20,000 fewer births  
than would take place had the rate  
of ten years ago been maintained.

#### Farm Implement Trade of Dallas.

The city of Dallas, Texas, is said to  
be the largest depot of farm imple-  
ment supplies in the world. Every big  
wholesale house in the United States,  
which engages in the business of man-  
ufacturing tools for the farmer has its  
branch at Dallas. There are twenty-  
five nine-story buildings devoted to  
this trade. Dallas lies in the very heart  
of the choicest farming region of  
Texas. It is the trading point of the  
great black land belt of the northern  
and central counties, which contain  
two-thirds of the people and three  
fourths of the wealth of the state.

#### A Gallant Governor.

In 1900 the Southern Music Teach-  
ers' association held a convention at  
Atlanta. Gov. Chauler of Georgia en-  
joyed the recitals and lectures, and  
did all in his power to encourage the  
movement. The governor also held a  
brilliant reception, and at the conclu-  
sion of a musical number the governor  
exclaimed with much enthusiasm:  
"What is heaven's loss is our gain."  
"Just the reverse, governor," corrected  
a young lady, "you mean our loss is  
heaven's gain." "No," said the gov-  
ernor, bowing gallantly, "it is heaven's  
loss until you are all dead, then it is  
our loss."—Detroit Free Press.

#### IDEAL CHIEF OF DEMOCRACY.

Czarina of Russia Has Good Opinion of  
French President.

"M. Loubet," the czarina of Russia  
said some time ago, "is just the ideal  
chief of a democracy which I planned  
to myself when as a young girl I  
studied ancient and modern history.  
He is not a man of uniform. He seems  
to my mind clothed with a toga or  
other garment of antiquity." It is  
admitted that the present chief magis-  
trate of the French republic is the  
most republican the country has ever  
possessed. Born a son of the bour-  
geoisie, Emile Loubet has risen by his  
own good sense to the point of work-  
ing in the room of Napoleon I. and  
sleeping in a bed occupied by Na-  
poleon III. Not that these honors af-  
fect the man, but he is most jealous  
of the dignity of his high office. This  
absence of a personal pride makes him  
a marked contrast to his predecessor,  
President Faure, who was laughingly  
dubbed "Emperor Felix" by the people  
of the boulevards.
