Electricity as Medicine.

An instructive instance of the use of
electrical effects in a legitimate way
for treating diseases is described in

The practitioner makes use of high-
frequency alternating currents to
cause electrical coagulation, by means of
which drugs were introduced into the
tissues of the diseased part. In 22
per cent of the cases of cancer treated
the treatment was successful. He has
come to the conclusion that a radio-
active salt of strontium induced into
the tissues by cataphoresis by high-
frequency currents would prove a
panacea for all forms of cancer.
