

Friar's Soup.

Cut up very finely any fresh vegetables such as carrot, turnip, an onion, two leeks, some celery and the heart of a small cabbage. Put them into a saucepan, with four ounces of butter ar good beef dripping, and one ounce of brown sugar. Sprinkle them with pepper and salt, and cook them gently weak stock or water, and let all boil switchhoard ten cents. rently for an hour. Fry some bread, and serve as croutons of dice with the soup, which has been placed in a hot tureen.

Work into a quart of flour a tablespoonful of shortening, wet with a quart of warm water, add a tablespoonful of sugar and a half yeast cake dissolved in warm water. Beat hard for ten minutes, then cover and set aside all night. In the morning work in two quarts of saited flour. set to rise for four or six hours, or mtll light. Make into loaves, kneading each of these for five minutes. Cover with a cloth and when very fight bake.

Fig Pudding.

Put into a bowl a cup each of fine pread crumbs and milk and stand for an hour. Add a quarter-cupful of powdered suct, a half-cup of granu-'ated sugar,' three eggs, beaten light, end cinnamon and nutmeg to taste. Last of all, stir in a cupful of minced 5gs well dredged with floor. Turn into a greased pudding mold with a closely fitting top and boll for about three hours. Turn out and eat with a hard sauce

Plain Sponge Cake.

Into the beaten yolks of five eggs stir a cupful of sugar and a teacupful of flour that has been sifted three times with a teaspoonful of baking powder. Beat for at least fifteen minutes, before adding a tenspoonful of lemon fuire, and then fold in lightly the stiffened whites of the eggs. Bake immediately in a loaf-tin in a good oven for about three-quarters of an hour.

Strawberry Ice Cream.

Place a pint of cream in a saucepan with half a pound of sugar and set over the fire to heat, when the sugar is dissolved stand aside to cool; add another pint of cream. Mash a quart and a pint of ripe strawberries with half a cupful of sugar and let stand an hour; then strain the juice off, pour into the cream, mix well and turn into the





BUYING RUBIES IN BURMA.

A Peculiar Method of Bargaining for the Precious Stones,

The peculiar business methods of Driental merchants are illustrated by he manner of buying rubies in Burma. n the examination of rubles artificial light is not used, the merchants holding that full sunlight alone can bring out the color and brilliancy of the rems. Sales must therefore take place between 9 a. m. and 3 p. m., and the sky must be clear.

The purchaser, placed near a win low, has before him a large copper date. The sellers come to him one by one, and each empties upon this date his little bag of rubles. The surchaser proceeds to arrange them for valuation in a number of small heaps. The first division is into three grades, according to size; each of these groups is divided into three piles, according to color, and each of these piles, in turn, is again divided into three groups, according to shape. The bright copper plate has a curious use. The smallght reflected from it through the stones brings out, with true rubles color effect different from that with red spinels and tourmalines, which are thus easily separated.

The buyer and seller then go through n very peculiar method of bargaining by signs, or, rather, grips, in perfeckilence. After agreeing upon the fair ness of the classification, they Joh their right hands, covered with handkerchief or the flap of a garment and by grips and pressures mutually understood among all these dealers. they make, modify and accept propos his of purchase and sale. The hands are then uncovered and the prices are recorded.-Jewelers' Weekly.
