Newspaper readers hear very much these days concerning Marquis Ito and an article printed in a recent issue of the London World may be of interest. In this article, the writer says that Japan owes to Marquis Ito in a very great measure the position which she now holds in the world and that but for him Japan might be today a second China. Marquis Ito is described by this writer in this way: "He belongs by birth to what we should call the lower middle class, and has therefore had neither wealth nor influential connections to give him a helping hand. None the less, at an age when in England he would have been counted a boy he was already a minister plenipotentiary arranging terms of peace with great powers of Europe. For he had the good luck in very early days—it was a pure piece of luck—to attract the attention of the old emperor Komei Yenko, who was struck by his extraordinary ability and all-round cleverness that he took his education into his own hands and set to work to train him for a political career. In 1867 the old emperor died, but his successor, Mentsouhito, had just as high an opinion of Ito as his father had had, and as soon as he had power in his hands he made him governor of Hiogo, a year later he made him finance minister, and from that day to this Ito has practically ruled Japan."—Commonor.

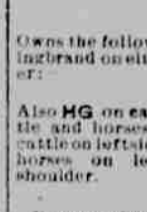

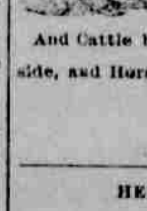
