**Another old Settler Gone.**  
Patrick F. Dunn, aged 87 years, died at his home northwest of Harrison on Thursday, June 16, at 7:30 P. M. after illness of several weeks.  
Patrick F. Dunn was born in Ireland and came to the United States when he was 18 years of age. He first settled in New York, where he lived for several years. He helped to build the Erie Canal and in the year of 66 he moved to Colorado where he lived until he came to this state. He was married in 1858 to Margerett Lacy who died at Boulder Colo., in 1887. Eleven children were born to this union, eight of which were living. Mr. Dunn came to Sioux county in 1888 where he has since been engaged in stock raising. He was a man that was highly respected by all, and the entire community mourn the loss by his death. 5 of his children, Joseph, Patrick, Philip, Richard and Lizzie, was present at the time of his death. The three other children two daughters and one son who reside in Colorado, were unable to be here. The remains were brought to Harrison on Saturday morning and shipped to Boulder Colorado where they will be buried beside the remains of his wife and other children. His son and daughter, Philip and Lizzie went on the same train that conveyed the body of the deceased. Mr. Dunn will be greatly missed by the many friends in this vicinity and the bereaved have the heart-left sympathy of all.
