

Commissioner's Proceedings.

(Continued from last week.)

Harrison, Neb., July 6, 1904.

Resolved: That the assessment of the year 1904 be as follows: Antelope, 1.21 per cent; Andrews, 1.21 per cent; Bowen, 1.21 per cent; Cottonwood, 1.21 per cent; Hat creek, 1.21 per cent; Montrose, 1.21 per cent; Snake creek, 1.21 per cent; Sheep creek, 1.21 per cent; Runningwater, 1.21 per cent; White river, 1.21 per cent; Whistle creek, 1.21 per cent; Warbonnet, 1.21 per cent; Village of Harrison, 1.21 per cent.

The following preamble and resolution on motion was adopted:

Whereas the assessed valuation of the county for the year 1904 is only \$71,421.55 as corrected by the clerk so far as assessed taxes may appear and whereas \$2,000,000 and more will be required to cover the estimated expenses for the year 1904, viz: interest on bonds, salaries, stationery, printing and publishing, incidental expenses, incidentals and office fees, he resolved to cause within 90 days the dollar of the total assessed valuation of the county for the year 1904 to be increased to \$1,000,000.00 by the following:

The board found the average assessment of horses to be in the county \$0.22 and in the various precincts as follows: Antelope, \$0.50; Andrews, 1.18; Bowen, 5.65; Cottonwood, 5.53; Hat creek, 1.29; Montrose, 6.07; Sugarloaf, 6.11; Snake creek, 5.47; Sheep creek, 5.76; Runningwater, 6.41; White river, 6.94; Whistle creek, 10.27; Warbonnet, 5.53; Village of Harrison, 9.08.

It was found that in order to equalize the assessment on horses the following changes in the various precincts was necessary and the following per cents ordered made:

Antelope, raised 54 per cent; Andrews, lowered 12 per cent; Bowen raised 22 per cent; Cottonwood, raised 14 per cent; Hat creek, raised 194 per cent; Montrose, no change; Sugarloaf, raised 51 per cent; Snake creek, raised, 151 per cent; Sheep creek, raised 94 per cent; Runningwater, lowered 14 per cent; Whistle creek, raised 54 per cent; White river, lowered 2 per cent; Warbonnet, raised 14 per cent; Village of Harrison, no change.

The board found the average assessed value of cattle in the county to be \$3.81 and in the various precincts to be as follows:

Antelope, \$3.54; Andrews 3.94; Bowen 3.53; Cottonwood, 3.45; Hat creek, 3.27; Montrose, 3.50; Sugarloaf, 3.25; Snake creek 4.86; Sheep creek, 4.88; Runningwater, 4.96; White river, 3.81; Whistle creek, 4.12; Warbonnet, 3.48; Village of Harrison, 3.71.

It was found to equalize the assessment on cattle in the county, the following changes in the various precincts were necessary and so ordered:

Antelope raised 84 per cent; Andrews lowered 24 per cent; Bowen raised 7 per cent; Cottonwood raised 11 per cent; Hat creek raised 172 per cent; Montrose raised 94 per cent; Sugarloaf raised 14 per cent; Snake creek, raised 64 per cent; Sheep creek lowered 24 per cent; Runningwater lowered 54 per cent; White river, no change; Whistle creek lowered 7 per cent; Warbonnet raised 11 per cent; Village of Harrison raised 14 per cent.

This month they are old men—those who have survived—and instead of looking forward their eyes are on the past, wistfully, maybe, and now and then dimmed with tears.

The dreams of their youth, where are they now? The young lawyer was going to end his days on the Supreme Court bench, but somehow things were ordered differently. The young preacher hoped by his eloquence to sway multitudes in the city, but he has kept only a handful in the country true to their heavenly vision. The physician planned to manage a hospital, but it has turned out that its wards have been a countryside.

On the other hand, the youth who was going back to the farm, who was regarded by his classmates as a humdrum fellow destined to live and die obscure, is now a conspicuous leader in Congress. There is probably not one in all that class whose life has been ordered even approximately as he had dreamed. This does not mean that the men have not succeeded.

Some of them have succeeded far more abundantly than they expected, but in a different way. What a man of seventy regards as success is usually a more gentle and human and kindly thing than that which the youth calls by that name.

The class of 1904 will doubtless have a history similar to that of its half-century-old predecessor. It may not be unprofitable for its members to think, a moment or two at least, of the old men holding reunions, and strive to get some of the tolerance and charity that characterize those who have traveled so far on the road that leads from the college door.—
