8-Year Sentence.

Verdict of Jury is Manslaughter. The jury in the Connolly case was filled at about 8 o'clock on last Thursday morning. Those on this jury were: Martin Carroll, Frank Scott, Geo. Umphenour, J. H. Dunlap, Geo. A. Cullers, Andrew Kenri, Sam Kuori, Frank Natto, Robert Jordan, James McCann, J. C. Shipley, Fred Langworthy. The state commenced to take evidence as soon as the jury had been arranged. There was a large number of witnesses on both sides of the case there being 17 for the state and 13 for the defense, but the testimony of each was short and the work of examination progressed rapidly. The state completed its evidence about 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon and the work of the defense began. By 9 o'clock Friday morning the testimony was all taken and the attorneys began their talk to the jury. There being two attorneys on each side, the pleas were not finished until nearly noon. After the instructions of the judge the jury went to the jury room to decide the innocent or guilty of the defendant. It was noon when the jury was sent to the jury room and at about 10 o'clock that night they informed the bailiff that they had agreed upon a verdict. The judge was notified and in a few moments he with attorneys and the clerk of the court were in the court room and the jury filed from the jury room to the jury box. The verdict of the jury was "manslaughter" the penalty of which is from one to ten years in state prison. The attorneys for the defense at once filed a motion for a new trial which was over ruled by Judge Westover and on Saturday afternoon the defendant was sentenced to a term of eight years in state prison. The motion for the new trial was carried to the Supreme court.

The readers of the JOURNAL will remember that on the 15th of March 1904 that one Henry H. Miller, of Alliance, was shot and killed on the Connolly ranch in the southern part of this county, and that James Connolly was arrested and charged with the crime. Mr. Connolly did not deny that he did the shooting but claimed that he did it in self-defense. It appeared that the men had had some trouble over the ownership of a steer. Immediately after the shooting Mr. Connolly gave himself up to the authorities and has since been in the jail here. He is 49 years of age and has a family.
