A BAD STORM

One of the worst storms of the year swept down on Harrison last Sunday evening at 5:30 and continued to pour down rain with small hail for about one hour. The storm was the heaviest to the north west falling on the dry draws and making things very hot at them. Washing our fences and everything that comes into road. Several culverts and bridges was washed out on the North Western track west of Harrison. Lightning struck James Bourret's house but did no great damage other than to knock four holes in the building. Luckily the family were away from home at the time or we might have a different story to write. Several families were caught out in the storm but we are glad to say no one was hurt, more than a good sound scolding. County treasurer Lux and family was coming in from his ranch on cottonwood when the storm's ruck man about one mile east of town and he managed to get his team undisturbed and did the best he could to protect himself and family by the side of the wagon until the storm abated when he drove over to J. W. Rands where he found ready funds to help him and family to get dry. L. Gerlach and George Gerlach and family were out in the storm, George says it beat any storm he was ever in. J. B. Bourret and wife and part of the children were also numbered among the unlucky ones but being in a covered rig suffered but little inconvenience other than to sit and wait for what might come, and R. V. James spent them after a time taking shelter by the side of the church and soon conveyed the little ones to his house. Water was running in every direction and some that had taken to their storn caves had to wait out and take their chances of the storm then being drowned in a cave. About the saddest thing that happened was the poor Editor losing his papers by being too near the flood, we had banked a great deal on these papers and was about ready to deny the strikers and packers both, but we will have to cut pork out of our bill-of-fare unless some delinquent comes to the rescue again.
