Lieutenant Davis' first sergeant, Clarence Gould, killed a Spanish soldier with his revolver, just as the Spaniard was aiming at one of my Rough Riders. At about the same time I also shot one. I was with Henry Bardshar, running up at the double, and two Spaniards leaped from the trenches and fired at us, not ten yards away. As they turned to run I closed in and fired twice, missing the first and killing the second. At the time I did not know of Gould's exploit and supposed my feat to be unique."

Yes, it is a unique feat to kill a fleeing soldier and more unique still to speak of it with levity and boasting. The taking of human life is an awful responsibility and however the customs of war may justify it when necessary who but a military enthusiast would speak of it as the president does? — The Nebraska State Democrat.

We have seen and talked with a good many old soldiers but this is the first instance where a man admits the killing of a fellowman, and especially where a man's back is turned to the enemy and running. President Roosevelt has stood before the world as a brave man but if his statement is true he is truly a coward, for brave men do not boast of their deeds and especially where they have to take the life of their fellowman, though it be in time of war.

Charles F. Coffee, the candidate for Senator of the 14th senatorial district, is so well known throughout the county and district that there is no question about his election.
