ON THE HUNT FOR GROUSE.

Incertain Bird to Which Rules Wil Not Always Apply.

The rulled grouse is one of the unsmall peculiarities of which advantage may be taken. In whit, heavy wood nd, his original haunt, he has a weakness for two things-un eld totecond, or any seldom used read and the bank of a stream. A man trying a bit of woods with which he is unacquainted probably will see more grouse near an old road than anywhere else. In hilly country the lower slopes of the ravines are apt to be the best of ground. In level country, the long strips of thicket borde ing targe blocks of standing timber are ideal places, and if the thicket happens to mark the edge of a clover field, so much the better. Never pass even a small thicket which stands out in a clover field with a wood upon any side. Grouse are fond of clover, and until winter sets in are apt to be in in snow time, the borders and interior of large woodland swamps are the chosen places.
