Richard Brommer Shot on Christmas Evening

Following a series of family rows, Richard Brommer, of Kensington, was killed almost instantly by a revolver shot near the heart on Christmas evening. It seems that there had been considerable quarreling between them, they taking opposite sides in different affairs of the neighborhood, one especially being a booze case which seemed to precipitate the rest of the quarreling. Brommer was preparing to leave the house, and gave a rather evasive and curt answer to Mrs. Brommer when she asked him where he was going. He had passed thru the kitchen into the bed room and on returning to go outside was met by Mrs. Brommer, who according to reports of the affair shot him. The 10-year old daughter being the only witness.

After the shooting, Mrs. Brommer was hysterical and it was with difficulty that her little daughter could persuade her to surrender. Since that day she has been unable to be arranged for trial, and is held pending further action at the county jail. Funeral services for Mr. Brommer were held Wednesday afternoon at Kensington. —Smith County Journal.

The Brommers were former residents in the vicinity of Red Cloud.
