COMPARES ROAD PROGRAM

Rev. E. N. Tompkins, former Methodist Episcopal minister at this place and of the Trinity M. E. church of Lincoln, but now at Fort Dodge, Iowa, writing to the Nebraska State Journal, has the following to say about Iowa's road program: "We cannot help but compare the road programs of the two states. Iowa is spending millions on her roads at the present time and competition is very keen between various cities in their bid for the tourist traffic which increases by leaps and bounds as the northern lake region becomes better known. Gravel and paving is the only method used to make a permanent highway, as a good dirt road is impossible here on account of the nature of the soil and the increased rainfall. On the whole aside from the main highway, the roads are a problem, not only to the motorist who uses them, but also to the counties which maintain them. Nebraska is wonderfully blessed with a fine dirt roadbed and one has only to remove from its advantages to realize the greatness of this asset. My judgement is that if the old state is wise she will capitalize this asset for the full amount of its value as Kansas certainly makes a great bid in this country for the traffic west to Colorado and the coast. It would be a great surprise to some to know of the large number who drive to California from here via the Kansas highways. It might not be amiss for the auto clubs of the state to take note of this fact and advertise very widely the fine highways of Nebraska."

E. W. Correll Buried Here

Edward W. Correll was born at Mt. Morris, Ogle county, Illinois on the 4th day of October, 1855, and remained in that place until he came to early manhood. From there he removed to Lenox, South Dakota, where in January 1886, he was joined in marriage with Nellie Van Dery. Two children were born to them, Frances, who is at this service, and James W. whose home is in California.

Returning to Illinois Mr. and Mrs. Correll united with the Baptist church at DeKalb where the home remained for some time.

The family came to Red Cloud in the year 1903, where Mr. Correll engaged in business, finally removing to the state of Colorado, where on the 20th day of November 1915 Mrs. Correll departed this life and was brought to Red Cloud for burial.

About three months ago Mr. Correll removed to Missouri, Miss Frances joining him about a week ago, and in the space of three days after her arrival he was stricken with apoplexy, departing this life on the 4th inst. and has been brought here for interment by the side of his wife.

Many will remember him as faithful in all his engagements and fulfilling all the duties and obligations of a friend and citizen.

The funeral was held at the Baptist church, Monday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. I. W. Elson with music by Mesdames Jones and Watkins, and Messrs. Cotting and Pierce, with Mrs. C. J. Pope at the piano.
