**CLOTHING SPECIALIST**  
Miss Myrtle Easley, Clothing Specialist of the Extension Service spends week in the County meeting with Women's Clubs and giving demonstrations on Sewing Machine Attachments and short cuts in sewing.  
Tuesday eight delegates from Red Cloud Community Club and seven delegates from the north Red Cloud Women's Club met in the Aid Society room of the Brethren church. Mrs. Fred Meyer and Mrs. J. B. Wisecarver were chosen project leaders.  
Wednesday five delegates from Get-To-Gather Women's Club, six delegates from Pleasant Prairie and nine delegates from Inavale Culture Club met in the Domestic Science room of the Inavale High School. Mrs. Jane Farley, Mrs. Louise Olmsted and Mrs. Cecil Benn were chosen project leaders.

**FEDERAL AID**

In a recent issue the Nebraska City Press discusses federal aid as follows:  
"Matching dollars, as the enemies of the Federal Aid Highway scheme call it, is to be a great issue before the Nebraska legislature next month, for our contract with Uncle Sam is about to expire and unless we appropriate a sum equal to that which the government has set aside for highway building and improvement in Nebraska we shall not get this financial aid. There is a wide-spread protest growing over Nebraska against Federal Aid appropriations, with the view, of course, of cutting taxation. But whether cutting this road making improvement scheme out of the budget would be an economic blessing in the future remains to be seen. Nebraska's highways have been the envy of visitors from other states and they have been the means of keeping transportation open all the year around. Comparison of the roads in 1922 with those of 1912, for instance, will make many a good Nebraskan hesitate before he insists in the abandonment of the Federal Aid plan for building highways. It is a well-established fact that highway maintenance left to the counties is not satisfactory. Fortunately there is little likelihood of Otter County having bad roads, no matter what sort of a scheme is adopted, but that doesn't speak for other counties where Federal Aid highway maintenance has been the only saving grace in the road conditions of those subdivisions. People who have no motor cars insist, naturally, that well-kept highways are a luxury for the motor car owner. They are narrow visioned when they adopt this view and express such an argument. Good roads spell success and comfort and good business for every man, woman and child in Nebraska. To abandon good roads in Nebraska would be to commit industrial and economic suicide."

**Soldier State Bonus Bill in House**

The Nebraska Legislature will soon have the opportunity to act on a state bonus which will carry \$10,000,000 to be distributed among the ex-service men of the state. Representative Keifer of Superior, past commander of that post, with the assistance of other ex-service men in the legislature drafted a compensation bill and placed it before the house last Friday.  
The bill provides for the payment of fifty cents a day to ex-service men for each day of service with a maximum allowance of \$450.  
The money will be raised by direct taxation for a period of two years. Conscientious objectors are barred from participating in the bonus under the provisions of the bill. A commission consisting of the adjutant general and two other members chosen by the governor would supervise the expenditure of the money.—Mid-West Vet.
