 After due consideration and a report of some length submitted by Superintendent Beard, the Council unanimously voted to lay over the water resolutions pending further development.
 Before adjournment Council instructed City Clerk as regards the enforcement of Ordinance No. 16, pertaining to dog tax.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS HELD SHORT SESSION ON YESTERDAY
 Red Cloud, Nebraska, March 21, 1923.
 The Webster County Board of Commissioners met at 1 o'clock p. m. as per adjournment of February 6th. All members present.
 The principal object of this meeting was to consider bids for Bridges for Webster county for the year 1923.
 At 2 o'clock the time set for opening said bids, it found the following firms bidding: Elkhart Bridge & Iron Co.; Western Bridge & Construction Co.; and Allied Contractors Inc.
 After all bids were read and tabulated it was found that the Allied Contractors Inc. were the lowest bidders.
 A motion was made by Waldo and seconded by Crowell that the contract for all bridges required by Webster county for the year 1923 be awarded to the Allied Contractors Inc. of Omaha, Nebraska. Motion carried.
 On account of the present condition of county funds no claims were allowed at this meeting.
 No further business appearing the Board adjourned at 4 o'clock p. m. to meet April 10, 1923.

Washington School Building Destroyed by Fire
 Sunday evening about 9 o'clock a fire broke out in the south wing of the Washington school building, the same being caused by defective wiring it is thought by many as there had been no heat in the plant since Friday.
 The firemen responded quickly but owing to low water pressure and inadequate fire equipment their work proved to be of no avail as the fire spread rapidly and soon gutted the entire building.
 The building was erected in 1882, and while R. D. Moutz was superintendent an addition was added and considerable altering was done. The past few years it has been used by the Junior High School department and also the Domestic Science class. A large number of the citizens of this community attended school in this building receiving their high school education, and the familiar ring of the old bell will be missed by many as well as the students. It is stated the building had been condemned several years ago and no insurance was carried on it or the contents, thus there was a considerable loss to the district. The walls were razed to the ground Monday.
 After considerable arrangements being made Monday the students were all placed in the Senior High School and school work is going on as usual under the efficient work of Sup. Gelwick and his corps of teachers.

District Court in Session
 The March term of District court with Judge Blackledge presiding convened Monday. The jury was to have been called Tuesday but owing to the bad roads and not enough cases they were dismissed. Several motions were heard and confirmation of sales ordered. Fred Rehn plead guilty to the charge of illegally manufacturing booze and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 and serve thirty days in jail at hard labor. The divorce case of Carrie V. Bula Mae Jarboe Dies From Burns

Bula Mae Jarboe, eight-year-old daughter of Rev. and Mrs. J. Edwin Jarboe, 2411 Lynn street, is dead from burns received at her home Sunday morning. Her gown caught fire from an electric heater and before her mother got to her she was a mass of flames. She was badly burned from head to foot and died during the afternoon at a hospital, after suffering intensely from her injuries.
 The father was out of the city and the mother had gone down to the basement to fix the furnace. While she was gone the little girl was standing by an electric heater. Her gown caught from the resistance coil and in a second her whole body was a mass of burns from head to feet and little hopes of saving her were held from the first.—Mondays Lincoln State Journal.
 The remains were brought to Red Cloud, Wednesday, and funeral services were held at the Brethren church after which interment was made in the city cemetery.
