**COUNCIL REDUCES CITY'S DEBT BY \$2,000.00**

The Council Chamber being used for election purposes on last Tuesday, Mayoress Mary Peterson adjourned the regular monthly session at this time, until Friday, April 6, at 4 p. m., when it found all members present.

After the minutes of the March meetings had been read and approved, the report of City Treasurer, S. R. Florance, presented and placed on file. City Superintendent, H. M. Beard, reported that not much progress had been made in the water situation since the last meeting.

The Council next proceeded to canvass the vote of the General and School election, held on April 3rd, with the result that the official count did not alter the heretofore published results and the Clerk was authorized, to issue the necessary certificates of election.

On motion by Alderman Crabill, duly seconded by Alderman Hoffman, the Mayoress and Clerk were instructed to make a payment of \$2,000 on outstanding water bonds.
