### DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL STOCK JUDGING CONTEST

A District High School Stock Judging Contest was held in Clay county this was a preliminary contest held prior to the state contest at Lincoln May 4th. Then schools with 78 contestants competed. Blue Hill High School represented Webster county having won the County Championship last October. The Blue Hill team are William Arndt, Daniel Krueger and Alfred Sommerfelt.

The Clay County Contest started with judging two classes of Short-horn cattle at the farm of Albert Hut line. Class of Holsteins at the farm of Wm. Peterson, class of Percheron mares at farm of Geo. Schab, Shropshire sheep at the farm of Wm. Walker, Duroc hogs at Geo. Briggs, Poland hogs at H. L. McKelvie, Ayshire cows at farm of H. H. Johnson, Jersey cows at farm of W. F. Holcomb and Shire Mares at the farm of H. H. Harvey.

The judging was completed by 1 p. m. and in the afternoon the contestants gave their reasons.

At 8:30 we were given a banquet by the Home Economics Class of Clay Center High School and judging from the big feed Clay county will have some real cooks.

Following the banquet a short program was given. Mr. Epperson of Fairfield was toastmaster and toasts were responded to by Mr. Wood, Judge Wray, Mr. Derrick, Mr. Flock, and Mr. Morgan and the announcement of winners by Mr. Wm. Pearson, director of Vocational Training of Nebraska.

Team scores were as follows: Hastings 1638, Clay Center 1637, Blue Hill and Milford (tie) 1590, Friend 1556, Aurora 1528, Milligan 1440.

Individual scores were as follows: Alfred Sommerfelt 4th, score 549; William Arndt's score 527 and Daniel Krueger's score 514.

Alfred Sommerfelt won first in judging horses and 5th on swine. William Arndt was 5th on horses.

To put on this successful judging four meant lots of work on the part of M. H. Peters of the Clay Center High School and County Agent, Claybaugh and there was true cooperation shown on the part of the Livestock Breeders and the Clay Center Chamber of Commerce.

### Obituary

Mary A. Ostheimer was born in Germany, September 23, 1842, and departed from this life April 15, 1923; aged eighty years, seven months and twenty-two days.

She came to the United States with her parents when a small child and resided in Connersville, Fayette County, Indiana. Here she grew to womanhood and was married to William H. Walter, October 13, 1869.

In March 1872, they moved to Webster County, Nebraska, and settled on a homestead west of Inavale, where they resided for twenty-six years. In 1897 they moved to Red Cloud where they have since made their home.

To this union were born seven children—four sons, Lewis, William, Edward, and Charles; three daughters, Anna, Alice and Ida. One son, Lewis, and a daughter, Alice, preceeding their mother to the Great Beyond.

The deceased has been in poor health for several months, and suffered a stroke of paralysis Saturday afternoon, from which she never rallied. She was a kind and loving wife and mother, who thru her untiring efforts made home a loved retreat for her family.

Mrs. Walter expressed her desire to become a member of the Christian church but did not live to be received into fellowship.

The services were conducted from the Christian church by the pastor, Rev. C. G. Nelson. The interment being made in the Red Cloud Cemetery.
