FOCUS YOUR LIGHTS

There is nothing more annoying than to have the lights of an approaching automobile so dazzling that one cannot see the road. Many accidents on the road are caused by this dazzling light.

Various devices have been brought forward to eliminate this condition and they have all proven worthless if at the same time they will allow enough light to illuminate the road for driving. Some states passed laws requiring that the upper part of all lenses must be covered. It was then found that on some cars it was necessary to cover the lower part instead of the upper part to keep the rays from reflecting upward.

The reflector in the headlights of automobiles is in the form of a parabola. This reflector has what is called the focal point. When the light bulb is placed in this focal point, the light rays are reflected in parallel lines.

If the light bulb is placed behind the focal point, a large, diverging cone of light is produced.

If the light bulb is placed in front of the focal point, the rays of light cross each other a short distance in front of the headlight.

In the last case, the rays of light from the lower part of the reflector are the dazzling rays and it would be necessary to cover the lower part of the lens.

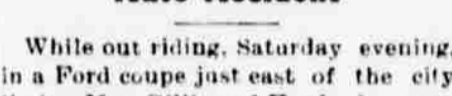
All headlights have a device for the proper adjustment of the light bulb so as to give the proper light for the driver and at the same time not to interfere with the driver of the approaching auto. Unless this adjustment is made all headlight lenses or other non-glaring devices are useless.
