ORNAMENTAL VINES

For the summer house and arched approaches to the formal flower garden the climbing roses are of superior quality with the super abundance of bloom in June. The hardy native prairie rose, Rosa setigera, altho not a very tall climber, is very suitable for covering medium sized building; this is very free from insect pests and fungous diseases. After the period of flower the red seed pods are very decorative in late summer. Prairie Queen, a progeny of the setigera with all of the good habits of its parent, covered with a profusion of single pink and white flowers, has real merit for our Nebraska climate. The Dorothy Perkins, one of the Wichuriana or Memorial rose hybrids, has the good qualities of the parent in regard to its lustrous foliage remaining on the plants until late fall. The coral pink clusters of flowers are borne in great profusion and last for a period of three or four weeks. It is one of the most rampant growers, which makes it a good plant for covering large, unsightly embankments. The Crimson Rambler, very conspicuous with its wealth of blossoms, has use as a climber if planted in the right place. Plant if possible on a trellis or arbor away from Dorothy Perkins or red brick building. This variety is very susceptible to mildew.

CREEK WATER SOON ON TAP
Mayoress Mary Peterson called Council together in regular adjourned session on Monday, with all members present except Crabill and after generously ordering \$180.00 transferred from the Electric Light Cash Fund to the Library Fund, for the upkeep of the latter up to July 1, this year, the Mayoress proceeded to swear into office the newly elected Councilman Grant Christy, of the Second Ward. Whereupon the old Council adjourned sine die and on Tuesday the Mayoress called the new Council together in special session with all members present for the purpose of organizing Council, making appointments, granting pool hall licenses and considering water proposition.

After the election of A. H. Hoffman to the presidency of the Council, the Mayoress announced the following appointments, which were duly confirmed by the Council:

Light and Water Commissioner, H. M. Beard, \$150.00 per month.
Health Physician, Dr. Henry Cook.
City Attorney, Jas. Gilham, \$100.00 per year.

Bookkeeper, Mrs. M. A. Albright, \$30.00 per month.
Street Cleaner, C. R. Lewis, \$85.00 per month.

The Mayoress then appointed the following committees:

Advisory—Mayor and Council.

Finance—Hoffman, Amack and Hummel.

Building—Amack, Hoffman and Christy.

Streets and Alleys—Christy and Hoffman.

The applications, with necessary checks attached of J. E. Ellison and G. R. Beck for pool hall licenses, were presented and unanimously granted with the exception of the support of Mrs. Hummel.

The Mayoress appointed Councilmen Hoffman and Christy to have the ditch leading from the pavement on Seventh Avenue to Crooked Creek cleaned.

On motion of Hoffman, seconded by Hummel, Light and Water Superintendent Beard was instructed to order a chlorinator to treat the water, turned from the creek, to supply the city with water.

Andrew S. Campbell

Andrew S. Campbell, who has resided in this city for many years, passed away at his home in the First ward last Friday evening. He was born in Indiana, June 3, 1841 and was aged 81 years, 10 months and 17 days.

In 1866 he was united in marriage to Rhoda E. Marshall, they coming to Nebraska in 1885 and resided near Wauneta later coming to Red Cloud where they have resided since. Two sons and two daughters were born to this union, the sons preceeding their parents to the Eternal home.

The deceased was a veteran of the Civil War having served over three years with Co. A, 59th Indiana regiment. He also was a member of the Methodist church.

The deceased is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Sadie Dudeck of Wauneta and Mrs. Rosie Wilnot of this city.

The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, Rev. H. W. Cope in charge, after which interment was made in the McCall cemetery.
