### Ernest Welsch Died Suddenly

Ernest Welsch, one of the most highly respected citizens and old pioneers of this city, passed away at his home in the First ward, about five o'clock Wednesday afternoon. The immediate cause of his death being a stroke of paralysis. Mr. Welsch for many years conducted a restaurant near the depot. Besides the aged wife he is survived by a nephew Henry Welsch, and other relatives. He had been a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge for many years and this lodge will have charge of the funeral services which will be held at the Christian church Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The obituary will appear next week.

### Baccalaureate Services Held at M. E. Church

The graduating class of '23, consisting of 35 of Red Cloud's school boys and girls, took their respective chairs at the M. E. Church on last Sunday evening, and listened to a splendid sermon preached by the Rev. Samuel Hardman, on the subject "Where There is no Vision the People Perish." "Vision is needed by all," he continued "but the necessity of today is the right kind of vision." And he dwelt on the subject of self-sacrifice, saying that, "Self-sacrifice is not a bitter cutting away of our personality. It is the enlargement of our personality to embrace others. We pass the boundary of 'I' and 'you' and think in terms of 'we' and 'our' and lo, we have found our greater selves."

The church was full to overflowing and necessitated putting seats in the aisles to accommodate the large audience.

The invocation was by Rev. Nelson, the lesson was read by Rev. Frantz, and Rev. Tweedy pronounced the benediction. Rev. Cope was master of ceremonies. The hymns and anthem sung by the choir were beautifully rendered.
