Mr. and Mrs. Charles Steele of Lincoln returned to their home Sunday morning after spending the past few days here at the home of her brother, Chris Zeiss.

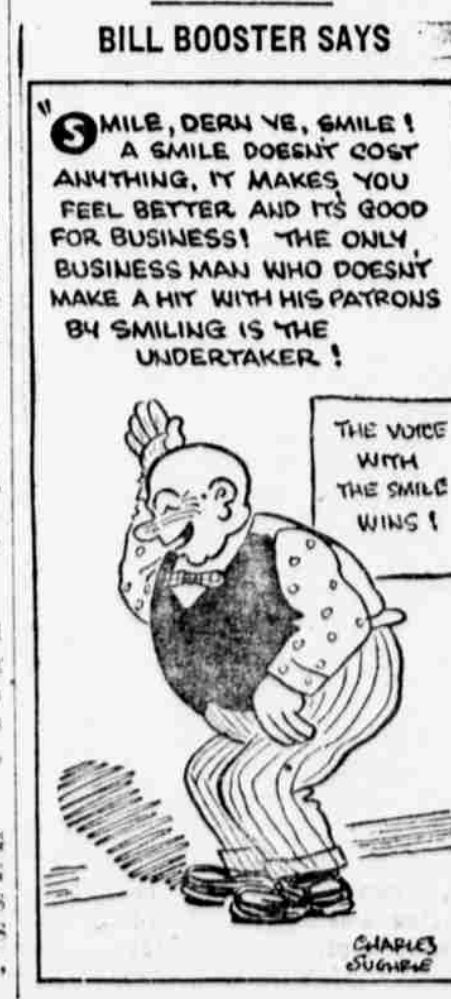
Miss Fay Richardson, who has been spending the past few months in Lincoln attending a business college arrived home Saturday evening, she having completed her course.

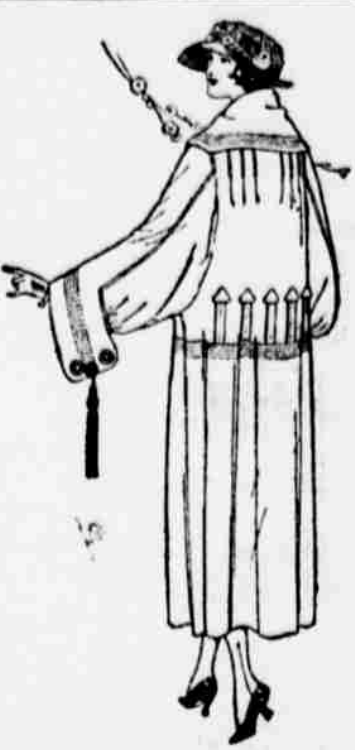
