Webster County feed lots were well represented on the Kansas City cattle market June 4 by 11 Hereford steers that scored the top price for the day and for the year by selling at \$10.90 a hundredweight. These market toppers were two-year-olds raised and fed by J. H. Crary of Guide Rock. They were well-fattened and rendered as to loin and quarters, and were the calves from Mr. Crary's herd of Hereford cows. The top figure was forty cents higher than bulk of sales which ranged from \$9 00 to \$10.50, showing a very satisfying premium paid for the good "whitefaces" from Webster County.
