The cowboys and cattlemen gathered here resting or training for the strenuous work and play of the coming roundup make a spectacular appearance about the city. A score or more representing the great ranches of the west and northwest arrived the first of the week from Belle Fourche, South Dakota, bringing their highly trained roping and bull-dogging mounts in special palace stock cars attached to the passenger train. These western characters, with their jingling spurs, fancy boots and beaver hats, that are high, wide and handsome, attract much attention as they gather in numbers on the streets discussing the coming chances for record smashing. The dates, July 18-19-20-21, give the men of the range ample time to reach Cheyenne in nice time to enter the events there.

Among those already present are: Leonard and Maye Strong; Rodley Ford, Colorado; Frank and Bonnie McCarroll, Boise, Idaho; Hugh and Mabel Strickland, Ft. Worth, Texas; Bud Hampton, Guyman, Oklahoma; Hank Durnell, Los Angeles, California; Dan Dix, Hollywood, California; Mike Hastings, Pendleton, Oregon; Babe Courvser, Denver, Colorado; George A. Newton, Portland, Oregon and many others who have ridden to stardom via the roundup trail.

More than two hundred head of frontier livestock are being gathered from the hills near the Wyoming line and the Dismal river country of Nebraska, and three longhorned Mexican steers, bucking horses and mules will arrive at any time, accompanied by the ranch hands called wranglers and their bosses.

Everything at the Cloud County Fair grounds where this monster celebration will take place is astir this morning as the heavy stockades and new bleachers are going into place. Those in close touch with the sport world declare that this will outdo anything attempted in roundup outside of Cheyenne, Wyoming, and Pendleton, Oregon, where the same rules and regulations are in force and many of the same headliners compete for prizes.
