Total Eclipse Seldom Seen

The total eclipse of the sun that takes place Monday will be visible in its totality only in California, so far as the United States is concerned, the path of totality being 105 miles wide and the area mostly around Los Angeles and San Diego. The total phase will last for two minutes, forty-nine seconds.

The eclipse will be partial in Nebraska, beginning at 2 o'clock for Lincoln and vicinity and continuing until about 4:20.

The last total eclipse visible in the United States was on June 8, 1918, the line of totality crossing the United States in a southeasterly direction from Washington to Florida. The path of totality of that eclipse was not over seventyfive miles wide and the longest duration of totality was only one minute and five seconds, at Dodge City, Kas. The eclipse on September 10 will be about three times as long, and astronomers hope to make many valuable photographs and observations.—State Journal.
