 "The first boy did a perfect job of showing," said Prof. Gramlich after the show. "He had his heifer well trained and tended to his business every minute." He deserved his place all right.  
 Alfred had never shown his heifer in competition before excepting in two classes at the Thayer county fair last week where he topped his class and won grand championship on his heifer. That was his first showing experience. He has always taken good care of his calf and has given her a little extra training for the past few weeks. He is a member of the Webster county calf club and has fed his calf eight months. He bought her from Henry Fausch's herd in the county. She stood fifth in the club class in the ring, Monday.—Lincoln State Journal.
