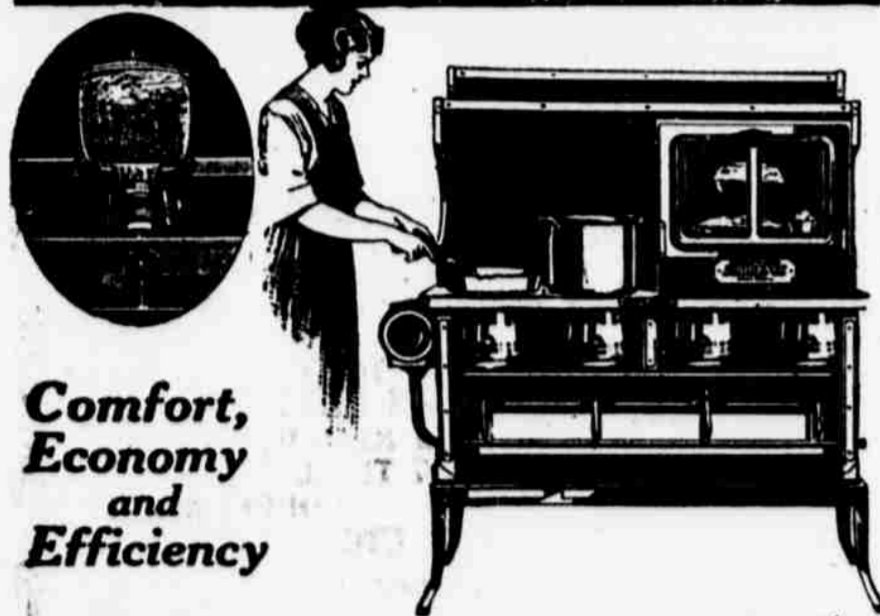

All the evidence points to Thomas Madison, a farm hand in the employ of Elmer Spurrier, as the perpetrator of the terrible crime.
