Report County Sunday School Convention

The thirty-fourth annual convention of the Webster County Sunday School Association met at the Red Cloud Christian church on Monday and Tuesday, October 1st and 2nd.

The attendance was cut down some by the rainy weather but most of the schools of the county were represented and great interest was shown in the addresses, reports and discussions, and particularly the last evening closing with a stereopticon lecture, by Miss Margaret Ellen Brown, entitled "6,000 miles thru India. The church was packed the last evening.

Pure Bred Sow Produces Almost Two Tons of Pork in 180 Days

With an official weight of 338 1/2 lbs. for a litter of twelve Duroc Jersey pigs, Texas now holds the world's record for tonnage of pork produced by one sow and for average weight per pig in six months time. The litter was weighed September 1st, when 180 days old, under the supervision of A. L. Ward, swine specialist of Texas A. & M. College and officials of the McLennan County Farm Bureau. The pigs averaged 321.9 pounds per head and made a daily gain of 1.8 pounds for the whole feeding period. The last twenty days the daily gain was 3 1/2 pounds for each pig.

The champion litter was bred and raised by Vic Hill of Chalk Bluff, McLennan County, Texas. The dam of the litter is Scotts Lucy No. 1390278 a registered Duroc-Jersey sow that was sired by the grand champion boar of the 1919 Texas State Fair. There were fourteen pigs in the litter which was farrowed March 5th. Twelve pigs were raised. The sow was three weeks less than three years old when the contest ended.

The total value of feed including pasture necessary to produce the litter \$228.84 making the cost of each hundred red pounds \$5.89. The pigs will be sold for breeding stock but as they were worth 9 1/2 cents per pound on the market the day weighed, they made a net profit of \$140.51. The litter consumed 8996 pounds of skim milk, 5420 pounds of corn feed meal, 2100 pounds of pig chow and 200 pounds of corn. They had the run of an eighteen acre Bermuda grass pasture with shade and water.

In order to be correct and certain on every point the litter was ear marked when seven days old by County Agent, E. R. Dudaly in the presence of the President of the local County Livestock Association. The scales used to weigh the litter were tested and sealed by the Waco city inspector of weights and measures. Mr. Dudaly supervised the care and feeding of the litter during the entire test. Mr. Hill received \$335 in cash prizes which were offered by the National Duroc-Record Association of Peroria, Illinois and Waco business houses.

Tree is a Bridge.
The greatest wonder of the Petrified forest is the agate bridge. This is a huge tree trunk, 100 feet long, spanning a 60-foot chasm, says Nature Magazine. The entire tree is made up of agates, jaspers, chalcedony, and other highly colored and handsome stones. In the canyon directly below the agate bridge is a pool of water, and around it grow the only trees in the whole country.

The letter of Chas. Siebrans of Blue Hill requesting a bridge on the north end of the road between section 28 and section 29 in Potsdam Precinct was referred to the bridge committee for investigation.

C. F. Austin filed a new bond signed by The American Surety Co. of New York and requested that this bond be approved and the private bond previously filed as Justice of Peace for Potsdam Precinct be annulled. On motion his request was granted.

On motion the County Clerk was instructed to order one copy of the 1922 statutes for C. W. Fulton, a Justice of the Peace in Harmony Precinct.

Motion made and carried that the claim of The Mary Lanning hospital of Hastings, Nebraska for \$165 for medical services for Francis O'fer be rejected. Said services not authorized by any member of the County Board.
