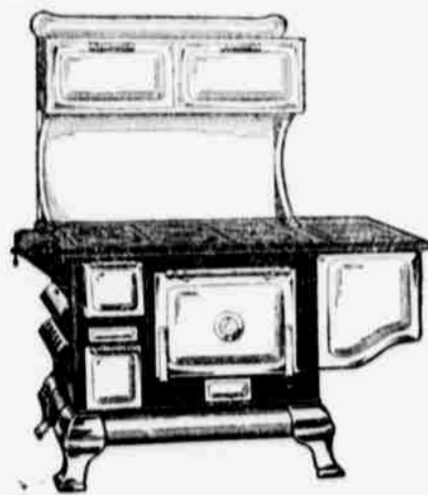

The three corn variety tests were hauled this week. H. W. Lambrecht's on Tuesday, this was bottom land, Geo. Ohmsted's on Wednesday, this was on bottom land and Fred Household's on Thursday, this was upland.  
The following are the varieties and the yields:

Lambrecht—Seed from Lambrecht, Lambrecht 68.1 bushels; Ohmsted's 87.9; Household 55.2.

St. Charles White—Seed from Fausch, Lambrecht 62.4 bushels; Ohmsted's 65.5; Household 50.5.  
St. Charles White—Seed from Ohmsted, Lambrecht 61.8 bushels; Ohmsted's 71.9; Household 45.3.

St. Charles White—Seed from Ohmsted, Smooth Kernel; Ohmsted 69. Nebr. Yellow Dent—Seed from Schultz, Lambrecht 70.3; Ohmsted, 65.4; Household 41.6.

Boone Co. White—Seed from Means, Lambrecht 62.1 bushels; Ohmsted 53.2; Household 52.5.

Reid's Yellow Dent—Seed from Lambrecht, Lambrecht 87 bushels; Ohmsted 56.5; Household 46.

Reid's Yellow Dent—Seed from Lambrecht, smooth kernel, Lambrecht 55.1.

Iowa Silvermine—Seed from Fausch, Lambrecht 62.4 bushels; Ohmsted 71.5; Household 49.9.

Kearney Co. Yellow—Seed from Larrick Ohmsted 53.2 bushels; Household 44.2.

Kearney Co. Yellow, smooth kernel—Seed from Larrick, Household 45.2 bushels.

Hitchcock Co. White—Seed from Household, Household 55 bushels.  
Hitchcock Co. White, smooth kernel—Seed from Household, Household 58.6 bushels.

Johnson Co. White—Seed from Lambrecht, Lambrecht 60.6 bushels.  
On bottom land the rough kernel corn out-yielded the smooth kernel while on the upland the opposite.

Seed from the upland out-yielded the seed from the bottom. These tests will be carried out further by weighing the corn over in 60 days to determine the moisture and shrinkage, and then it will be shelled to see which variety will shell out most pounds of shelled corn.
