### SCHOOL NOTES

Sent to—Mr. C. A. Fulmer, Director for Vocational Education; Mr. A. B. Gelwick, Superintendent of schools; Mr. Glenn Cook, Agricultural Instructor; Mr. B. F. Perry, Secretary.

Subject: Visit to the Red Cloud high school in the interest of the Department of Vocational Education.

The state supervisor of vocational agriculture spent Tuesday, October 16 visiting the agricultural department in the Red Cloud high school. The purpose of this visit was to check the equipment in the department and to offer any assistance for the improvement of the work in this community and to see if this department was meeting requirements for state and federal law.

The first class which meets in the morning was having farm shop work. The boys in this class spend two-fifths of their time for vocational agriculture on farm shop work and the other three fifths on agricultural work. The boys were making troughs, chicken feeders, bulletin file, small table top and painting articles that they had made in the shop. In other words the boys were doing the kind of shop work that meets the needs since this is the type of work they will do on their farms. During the year they will have rope work, tool sharpening, soldering, window repair, additional woodwork and some work on gas engines. The remaining mechanical phase of the work will be given to them the second year.

The second class which is held in the afternoon was also visited. This class was doing similar work to the other class. This is due to the fact that this is the first year the school has had the work.

Besides the class work and shop work each boy in the class, under the supervision of the instructor, is doing home project work. This is the practical work that is carried out in connection with the work. The projects in this are poultry, dairy, sow and litter and baby beef.

The equipment of the school is very good for most all of the work. Some additional tools will be needed when the complete mechanical course is offered. A small addition to the shop will also be needed at that time. A good class room is available for the work. The boys are at present making cabinets for the equipment which has been provided.

The supervisor was well pleased with the progress that has been made in so short a time. The general attitude towards the work is good. All of the boys seem to be very much interested in the work.

Since this school is meeting the requirements for a vocational agricultural school the supervisor recommends that it be approved for the semester. The approval of the school means that one-half of the instructor's salary will be paid by federal and state funds.—Copy of State Supervisors report of inspection.

### Obituary

Eveline A. Purdy was born in Scioto, Ohio, September 28, 1848, and passed to the Beyond in Red Cloud, Nebr., October 23, 1923—aged 75 years and 25 days.

She grew to womanhood in the Scioto community and was married to Amiziah Burt, March 12, 1865. To this union were born ten children: seven sons—Henry, Samuel, Calvin, Walter, John, Roy, and Ray and three daughters—Elizabeth, Mary and Ida. Mrs. Burt moved with her family to Arkansas City, Kansas, in the spring of 1877. They moved from there to Pawnee County Oklahoma in 1894. Here they lived on a Homestead until the death of her husband in 1908; since which time she has made her home with the children. She has been in poor health for the last three years.

There remain to mourn her departure: four sons—Samuel of Walla Walla, Washington; Walter of Redondo Beach, California; Roy of Torrance, California and Ray of Webb City, Oklahoma; two daughters: Mrs. Mary Murnahan of Red Cloud, Nebraska; and Mrs. Ida Aeda of LeRoy, Minnesota; one brother, W. A. Purdy of Edmond, Oklahoma and one sister, Mrs. Lillie McMahn of Durant, Oklahoma; nineteen grand children and five great grandchildren, besides other relatives and friends.

She united with the Christian church at the early age of ten, in the community where she was born and raised. After coming west she did not forget her church relation, but transferred her membership.

Services will be conducted at Red Cloud by Rev. C. G. Nelson, pastor of the Christian church. The interment will be made in Pawnee, Oklahoma.
