Mr. B. G. Moulton delivered his lecture "It Does Move" Monday evening, to a good audience. The substance of his talk is, that man, like every thing else, is an evolution from a lower animal and that creation of man as recorded in Biblical history is when God breathed, into the physical man, who had already existed for countless ages, morality or the power to distinguish and choose between right and wrong. The fact that many do not agree with Mr. Moulton does not in any manner detract from what he said. Knowing as he does that we are living in a time and a country where every man has a perfect right to believe as he pleases, and speak as he believes is a sufficient guarantee for him. It is very probable that he knew when he prepared his lecture that there would be people who differed from him. The simple fact that we may not endorse his evolution theory does not in any way deteriorate from the truths he uttered and we recognize in him one of the prime requisites of the successful teacher, the power of awakening thought. If those, who are so loud in their criticism of the talk would stop and consider that we are living in a time when, "It Does Move" and that the scholar does not blindly accept the teachings of his parents or his church as unquestioned, and further, if they would make a study of the question for themselves, it might be possible that their differences would not be so great as they imagine them to be.

The regular work of the institute closed last night and examination certificates is being held today. The interest in the work has continued throughout the session and the teachers will no doubt go to their schools stronger in their determination to do better work.

The question often comes to our mind, Does the institute pay for the expense incurred? Too often the teacher attends to have a good time, but we believe that good work has been done here this year and that those who were concerned enough about their profession to want to improve, have been benefited. The county superintendent should now see to it that those who came to have a good time be given ample opportunity to have it but it should be outside the school room.

We hear nothing but words of praise, of the lecture given by Dr. J. W. Jennings Tuesday evening.

He left, in the minds of all his hearers a strong desire for a life of more usefulness and a higher regard for humanity and for civilization. Dr. Jennings and a good talk are synonymous terms and he is always more than welcome in Hemingford.

Thursday afternoon the Box Butte County Teachers' Association elected officers for the ensuing year, L. B. Fenner President, Maud Daws Vice President, Susie Frazier Secretary-Treasurer, and Dr. R. A. Ordinance No. 34.

An ordinance levying taxes for the year 1895 to defray the general and incidental expenses of said village and making the annual appropriations for said year.

Be it ordained by the chairman and board of trustees of the village of Hemingford, Nebraska, Section 1. That there be and is hereby levied upon all the taxable property of the village of Hemingford, Nebraska, a tax of ten mills on each dollar valuation thereof, as shown by the assessment rolls for the year 1895 to defray the general and incidental expenses of said village for said year.

Section 2. That there be and is hereby levied against each male inhabitant of said village, between the age of 21 and 50 years, except inmates, paupers, idiots, and U. S. pensioners, a poll tax of \$3.00 for the year 1895.

Section 3. That for the year 1895 there be and is hereby appropriated out of the revenues derived from the taxes levied to defray the general and incidental expenses of said village the several amounts for the specific objects named herein as follows: For salary of Village Attorney - \$50.00, Treasurer - 10.00, Clerk - 50.00, Overseer of streets - 50.00, Printing - 20.00, Incidental Expenses - 130.00, Total - \$360.00.
