boards in the east. The truth is that the supply of money has little to do with prices, which are based on the cost of production, but regulated by supply and demand. They are affected also by state of credits.

Prosperity which stimulates prices depends upon safe credits more than upon the volume of money. Money may be abundant, and prosperity wholly lacking; but credit cannot be abundant without prosperity.

Confidence, which is the basis of credit, increases the use and active supply of money. It is also a great distributor of money, a great equalizer of its circulation.

The advocates of inflation, whether by free coinage of silver, or other methods, destroy confidence and thus destroy the only rational means of securing what they really want, an active increase of the volume of money in the channels of trade.

They get hold of the wrong horn of the dilemma. They propose an artificial and consequently unsafe increase in the money supply, believing that they can thus increase the circulation and put up prices.

The plan inevitably works the wrong way. Too many distrust the scheme. The money is locked up, nobody wants to invest or to buy beyond actual needs, and prices go down instead of up.

Then the stump orator comes upon the scene, abuses the "gold bugs," and lays the consequence of this folly at the door of the "money power."
