Let's Have an Artesian Well.

At their meeting the 17th inst.,
the commissioners decided to
submit the question of sinking
an artesian well on the poor
farm, to the voters at the coming
election, also the question of
levying a special tax of five mills
on the dollar of assessed valua-
tion for 1896, provided the first
proposition meets with the ap-
proval of a majority of the
voters. A petition signed by a
good many of the citizens of the
county had been filed asking that
the first proposition be submitted
and that of voting \$5,000 bonds
to defray the expenses of the
well but the commissioners be-
lieve it wiser to levy a special tax
than to vote bonds.

If a majority of the voters
favor the sinking of a well it
will be done next year and the
people will then ascertain if this
plan of irrigation is successful
and the whole people will bear
the expense of the experiment
which may prove of great value
to this portion of the state.
