The trans-Mississippi congress convenes in Omaha next Monday.

Weather prophet Hicks predicts an abundance of rain for Nebraska during the next season.

Last week we stated, upon the strength of a telegram received by one of our citizens, that Judge Bartow was elected by four votes. They are having trouble over the count up there, and as the matter stands now, it is hard to tell which one will hold the office.

The wisdom of the government in printing its own postage stamps is shown by the annual report of Mr. Claude M. Johnson, Chief of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, where the work is done. Although the postage stamps have been better printed than ever before the government paid less by between \$50,000 and \$75,000 than it ever before paid for the same amount of work.

According to reliable figures given to an Express reporter, there have been shipped over the B. & M. from points west of Newcastle, from July 1 to October 23, 2,965 car loads of cattle. At 21 head of cattle to the car, the Burlington has handled 62,265 head in three and a half months. The shipment are still on the increase, and the returns to January 1 will be largely in excess of this amount. The building of the Deadwood and Billings extension of the Burlington has been a profitable investment. —Edgemont Express.

How completely Mr. Reed will dominate the republican majority in the House is shown in the scramble for the other offices of that body. Although a number of candidates have been in the field for some time they have been able to get very few members to commit themselves; they are all waiting to find out Reed's choice before announcing their own. By the way, speaking of Reed and his method, there is something for those republicans who have been yelling "Wall street domination!" at the democratic administration and Congress to ponder over in the republican announcement that Mr. Reed has been consulting Wall street bankers to learn what their wishes were concerning financial legislation.

The recent election was not a republican victory, but a democratic defeat, brought about by the foolishness of the democrats themselves. They undertook to run four democratic tickets in Kentucky, three in New York and two in all the rest of the states. It is not because the democrats are not strong enough if they will stay together that they owe their defeat. It was the same thing that caused the downfall of the party in 1860 when it undertook to run two tickets over the question of whether Kansas by a vote should decide whether slavery should be extended to her borders or whether it should exist there without the consent of the people. When parties allow themselves to be led into such foolish questions that, and the free silver fad, they deliberately commit self destruction, the republican party had nothing to do with it. —Newcastle Democrat.

Captain H. W. Howgate, whose wholesale embezzlement of government money was a national sensation some fifteen years ago, having exhausted all legal quibbles, or his money, will this week be taken to the Albany penitentiary to serve the eight-years sentence imposed upon him by a jury that saw things somewhat differently from the jury which at an earlier date declared

him not guilty as charged in the first indictments, and confirmed by a decision of the Court of Appeals against a new trial for him. Notwithstanding Howgate's known guilt, and his known whereabouts during all the thirteen years after he was allowed to escape, justice was slow in overtaking him, and the sentence imposed upon him light when compared with those given ordinary thieves. Had not Secretary Morton ordered his arrest he would still be at liberty, although everybody in Washington appeared to know that he was living in New York.

On that day let us forego our usual occupations and in our accustomed places of worship join in rendering thanks to the Giver of every good and perfect gift, for the bounteous returns that have rewarded our labors in field and in the busy marts of trade, for the peace and order that have prevailed throughout the land, for our protection from pestilence and dire calamity and for other blessings that have been showered upon us with an open hand.

And with our thanksgiving let us humbly beseech the Lord to so incline the hearts of our people unto Him that He will not leave us nor forsake us as a nation, but will continue to us His mercy and protecting care, guiding us in the path of national prosperity and happiness, endowing us with rectitude and virtue and keeping alive within us a patriotic love for the free institutions which have been given us as our national heritage. And let us also on the day of our thanksgiving especially remember the poor and needy and by deeds of charity let us show the sincerity of our gratitude. In witness whereof I have set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

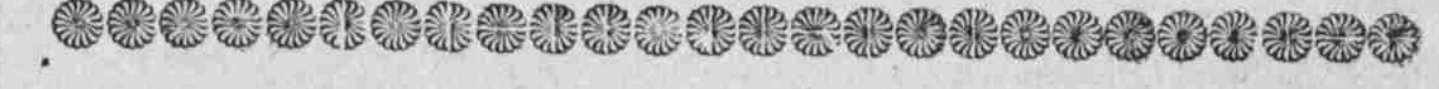
