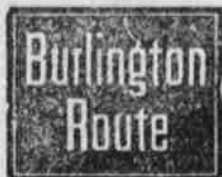

County Commissioners' Proceedings.

HEMINGFORD, Neb., June 15, 1896.

Regular meeting of Board of County Commissioners. Members present, James Hollinrake, chairman, Geo. W. Duncan and James Barry.

Board of Carl Weitz, road overseer district No. 22 was examined and approved.
It coming to the notice of the board that some confusion exists in the records as to whether a public road was opened commencing at the southeast corner section 12-26-50 and extending west to county line, or one commencing at the northeast corner section 12-26-50 and extending west to the county line, they investigated the records and found that in January 1889, (Commissioner's Record page 43) a consent petition by D. A. Paul and others was presented praying for a road commencing at southeast corner 12-26-50 and was granted and ordered opened. They also found the original petition and also report of survey of the road, both showing southeast corner 12-26-50. They therefore instruct the clerk to change such parts of the records as to show otherwise, to show that road No. 18 begins at southeast corner section 12-26-50 and extending west to county line.

In regard to road beginning at the northeast corner section 12-26-50 and extending west to county line, they find that a petition was filed in January 1889 (Commissioner's Record page 43) by Orville Kidwell and others praying for opening of that road and that same was referred to a special commissioner to view and report, but that no report of record was ever made nor any further action taken, hence it is considered and determined by the board that this road was never opened.

A. S. Eneyart presented claim for refund of taxes to the amount of \$15.51 on personal property for the year 1893, paid in 1894. It appears to the board that the same personal property had been assessed in the state of Missouri before being brought to Box Butte county, and that the taxes for the year 1893 on said property were paid by him in Missouri, and also had paid taxes for the year 1893, represented by tax receipt No. 191 on said property in Box Butte county, wherefore it appears that the identical property had been taxed twice for the same year, it is therefore ordered by the board that the county treasurer refund the said taxes of \$15.51 to said A. S. Eneyart.

The board then took up the consideration of claims against Box Butte county and having first obtained a certificate from the county treasurer showing amounts of delinquent personal taxes against each of the several claimants, allowed the following claims and ordered warrants drawn on the general fund for such amounts as remain after deducting such delinquent taxes.

Board met as per adjournment. Present, James Hollinrake, chairman, G. W. Duncan and James Barry.

Complaint was made by Henry Kramer that he had paid taxes twice for the year 1891 on northwest quarter 1-27-52; upon investigation and finding the facts as stated, the board orders the treasurer to refund \$7 82 of the taxes so paid.

The board then, after obtaining a certificate from the treasurer showing amount of delinquent personal taxes against each of the several claimants, allowed the following claims and ordered warrants drawn on the general fund for such amounts as may remain after deducting said delinquent taxes.

Claim No. 3025, amount \$20.00, was received from school district No. 6 for tuition of non-resident pupils, and was allowed and warrant ordered drawn on county school fund, levy 1896.

Petition was presented by Wm. Drefke and thirty others asking that roads be opened for public travel commencing on the township line between townships 25 and 26 at the northeast corner of section 6-25-47, thence south a distance of three miles to the northeast corner of section 19-25-47, also from the southwest quarter of section 7-25-47, thence east three miles to the southwest quarter section 10, township 25, range 47.

The Board after consideration finds that the public good requires the opening of such roads and as authorized by section 46, chapter 78, compiled strates of Nebraska, for year 1895, they hereby declre the same to be opened for public travel. The clerk is instructed to notify the road overseer to remove all obstructions, open the same and cause them to be worked as public roads.

The Lincoln Land company presents tax receipt No. 922, \$11.78, taxes for year 1895 paid under protest on lot 16, block 9 Alliance, also affidavit of assessor showing that it was assessed at \$225, under the misapprehension that it had certain improvements, whereas it was and is a vacant and unimproved lot, and stated also that it should have been assessed at \$75.

The Lincoln Land company asks that the tax on the difference between the two values amounting to \$7.87 be refunded. After due consideration the board denies such refund on the ground that complaint of this nature should have been made before Board of Equalization at its session in 1895, and for that reason not now in the power of the board of county commissioners to make such refund.

At 6 p. m. board adjourned to meet at 8 a. m. June 17.

John Leith presented a receipt for \$1.00, taxes for 1895, paid under protest on northwest quarter of northwest quarter 7-24-50 and asked that the same be refunded on the grounds that it was government land and not taxable; on investigation the board finds the facts as stated and orders the treasurer to refund said amount of taxes.

Geo. W. Duncan presented receipts for taxes paid under protest on northeast qr sec. 9-24-48 as follows: Year '93 \$16.90, year '94 \$18.95, year '95 \$11.00, and asked that each of these amounts be refunded because said tract was government land and not assessable.

The board after investigation found the facts as stated and ordered the treasurer to refund all of said taxes amounting to \$47.75.

On motion the clerk was instructed to advertise for bids on one car egg hard coal and one car Canyon City nut coal, for delivered on board cars at Hemingford. Such bids to be in on or before the next adjourned meeting of the board, to-wit, on July 30, 1896.

On motion board adjourned to meet at 8 a. m. July 30, 1896.
