O'Neill, Neb., June 11.—A rousing and enthusiastic meeting of the citizens of O'Neill was held in the court house tonight for the purpose of meeting Donald McLean, the well known railroad promoter. Mr. McLean in a brief but lucid manner explained the great advantages to be derived from the construction of an independent line from Ponca to O'Neill via Creighton thence west to the Pacific coast. Stirring speeches in favor of the new enterprise were made by Mayor Gillespie, Judge Kinkaid and other

leading citizens. A communication from Geo. E. Cheeny, of Creighton, stating that the citizens of that place were fully alive to the new enterprise, was read. A committee consisting of Mayor Gillespie, O. O. Snyder, M. F. Harrington, J. J. McCafferty, J. P. Moun and John McHugh, was appointed to act jointly with like committees selected by other towns along the new route in promoting the new enterprise. The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the city of O'Neill and surrounding country are in full sympathy with the proposed new route and are willing to render any assistance within the range of their ability to aid the enterprise.

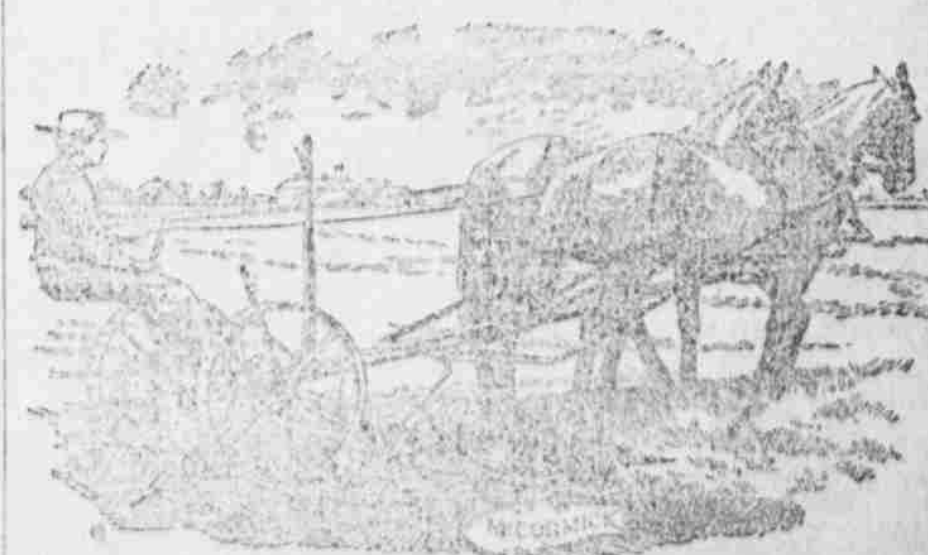
