EDGAR HOWARD UNWILLING TO PUSH FRERICH'S CASE

COLUMBUS, Neb., Jan. 20 .- (Special.) -Showing extreme lenlency to the man who had endangered his life by running him down with an auto on New Year's day, Edgar Howard, editor of the Columbus Telegram, secured the acquittal of the man upon the payment of the small fine of \$10 and costs, totaling \$24.75.

The man is Henry Frerichs, residing near Osceola, and upon being arraigned last week by County Attorney Walter before Judge Ratterman pleaded not guilty. However, Wednesday upon resumption of the case he pleaded guilty through his attorney. August Wagner, to driving through the public thoroughfare at a

speed exceeding the legal limit. Upon announcement of Prosecutor Walter that he would proceed with the other three counts-driving his car while under the influence of liquor, driving at night without lights and driving across a street intersection at a speed in excess of six miles an hour-Edgar Howard made a plea for clemency to the court and the remaining charges were dismissed.


